Central Michigan University. The following information is offered to assist you in utilizing the stadium's services and facilities.

## SEATING

During football games all the seats on the During football games all the seats on the
east sideline (behind the CMU team bench) are for the use of Central's students on a firstcome, first-served basis. The seating behind the south end zone is for general admission ticket holders and any overflow from the student seating section.
All reserved ticket seats, including season tickets, are in the west stands (behind visiting team's bench). The sections are identified by
aisles, lettered A-H, with Aisle A at the north end. Rows are numbered $1-36$, starting at field level. Seats $1-14$ are to the left of the aisle, 1528 to the right.

## GOLDEN SEATS

In order to stimulate fund-raising for the $\$ 1.5$ million campaign that helped pay for the stadium, a Golden Seat section was created under the press box. Tickets in this sheltered area are lettered CC, DD, EE, FF and numbered
rows $37-42$. The 410 seats are sold on a seasonticket basis only and are restricted to those CMU boosters who contributed $\$ 600$ per seat during the stadium building campaign.

## TICKETS

Tickets are sold Monday through Friday in Tickets are sold Monday through Friday in
the ticket offices at the Dan Rose Center adjacent to the stadium, and at the University Center on Preston Street. On game days, the stadium ticket booths open at $10 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. General admission tickets are always sold on game days plus any unsold reserved seats. Tickets for
future home games will be on sale at the stadium booths immediately after the home games. The top prices are $\$ 6$ for reserved and $\$ 4$ for general admission. Some road game tickets can be purchased during the week at the
Rose Center ticket office. For additional ticket information, call (517) 774-3041 Monday through Friday.

## EMERGENCY AID

 Authorized personnel are on duty to renderemergency medical treatment in the first aid room which is located behind the south concession stand under the press box. Doctors may use the telephone in the first aid room to respond to emergency calls. Central Michigan Community Hospital has an ambulance crew on standby duty at all home games.

Food, drink and souvenirs may be purchased the concession stands at each end of the service buildings on both sides of the field.
Administered by the University's Food Services, the stands are augmented by soft drink booths at the southeast and southwest corners of the stadium.

BACKGROUND
CMU's football home is named after the late R. Perry Shorts, a Central alumnus who played on the 1899 team and through his in-
dustriousness and intelligence became a banking and civic leader in Saginaw. He established scholarships at the University in his sisters names. As the University's oldest living football letterman, he spoke briefly but ceremonies in November, 1972. The Chippewas defeated Illinois State, 28-21, that day.
The stadium features the first collegiate Astro Turf playing surface in the state, has more than 20,000 permanent seats, can easily accommodate an additional 5,000 temporary bleachers and has been ulized for numerous games.

When he worked with us as a graduate assistant in 1973, he earned very favorable comments from the young players he in-

Mike responds, "I want to be a student of the game. It's impo tant to understand the game well . . .

Poff speaks seriously and with great concern for his unit of players. His specific responsibilities are the inside running game and the line, which he feels this year "has the ability to be a great line if the players will work up to that ability.
He states, "If we can avoid injury, we can do it (win the MAC again ... And we have to have luck. Nobody wins a champion ship without luck.'
Poff feels the most difficult aspect of the game for college offen sive linemen is the diversity of demands upon the use of thei position within the unit. Also, there is the constant pressure of be ing ready to make immediate adjustments upon seeing any one of a huge number of different defenses and defensive shifts. Poff understands this pressure personally; having been a center, he
was required to snap the ball 80 times per game with perfect timing.
In coaching his unit, Poff works extremely hard on technique "right down to He teaches his players "to step first, then read." He breaks down each technique into individual moves. He admits that "I'm so involved
with the inside game, in pracwith the inside game, in practhe ball is."
On game day, Poff sees his job as getting his players prepared mentally for their job on the field. He believes in building up their pride in team effort.
That team pride is one of the reasons Poff feels Coach Deromedi is a successful coach and person. Poff explains that Deromedi treats everyone with respect, does not interfere with his coaches' work and gives his coaches the responsibility and atitude in which to make their own mistakes. Poff says, "Every year I'm with Herb, I find more and
would be very hard to leave Herb."
Poff uses the computer printouts created by the team's graduate assistants to anticipate what types and numbers of defenses the opponent will use. He makes up a composite of the defense's look," which might consist of 25 different defenses. He explains, "If we see a new or different defense against us, I should be able to nalyze it in five minutes and come up with a counter action."
In recruiting for offensive linemen. Poff claims he looks for size first in athletes. "Then feet - they have to have good feet. They have to have the ability to move their feet." Next, he looks for the ability to hit. He feels that speed is not a factor in the makings of a good offensive lineman.

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## Three-Man Staff Equips Football Team

Armies may run on their stomachs, but football teams run on their equipment 15 to 20 pieces of equipment per player When the team numbers in the range of 125 players, there are 2,500 pieces of equipment to be inventoried, laundered, repaired, stored, packed for away games
and replaced on the player's shelf. The 2,500 pieces of equipment include shirts, pants, socks, shoes, supporters, helmets, knee pads, thigh pads, hip pads, shoulder pads, elbow pads, hand pads and gloves. Louie Doughty, a member of the Central Michigan University family since 1969, is equipment manager supervising the Shorts stadium football equipment room. He is assisted by two sophomores Williams of Middleton.
On the days of two practices prior to the start of school and on Labor Day, the three staff members work in the equip ment room from 6 to $10 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. and from 1 to $6: 30 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. Once classes begin with
single practice each day, the equipment
staff works from 1 to 6 p.m. On a home game day, the start at 10:30 a.m. and finish up around $4: 30$ p.m. In addi-
tion, Doughty travels with the team to away games to en sure the safe arrival back at Shorts stadium of the 800 pieces of equipment that went on the road.
The actual laundering of 125 uniforms and towels after every practice and game is handled in the Rose Center equipment room by other members of the university equipment staff. Led by senior equipment manager Da Bookey, the staff includes Roy Rudolph and Jim Powell equipment managers, and 15-18 student aides
Doughty has developed two techniques for speeding up player's practice uniform are laundered in a single bag

which is tagged by player name and number. This idea speeds up the handling of hundreds of items and minimizes he number of lost pieces. Also, every player has in the equipment room a "game shelf" upon which is stored every piece of equipment that particular player needs for playing in a game. To pack for away games, the equipment staf merely empties each player's shelf into his respective travel
bag. Even with this time- and energy-saving method, Doughty claims it takes three days to pack for game trips
