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## Veterans Man Football Equipment Room

Louie Doughty, member of the CMU family since 1969
manages the Shorts stadium football equipment room. He is assisted by two seniors, Dave Pawlak of Monroe and Tim Williams of Middleton, who will finish their respective four years of service to the football team after the 1983 spring practice.
"With the cost of equipment you have to run the equipmen "With the cost of equipment, you have to run the equipment
room like a business," explains Pawlak, a major in business. "Do-
ing this job, you learn a lot of responsibility. You have to be an ${ }^{\text {organizer. }}$ CMU's football team runs on its organized equipment -15 to 20 pieces of equipment per player. Since the team numbers ap inventoried, laundered, repaired, stored, packed for away games and replaced on the player's shelf. The 2,500 pieces of equipment include shirts, pants, socks, shoes, supporters, helmets, knee
pads, thigh pads, hip pads, shoulder pads, elbow pads, hand pads pads, thogh pads
and gloves. Because every player has specific preferences as to size of
helmet, size and style of pads and style of face mask, the equiphelmet, size and style of pads and style of face mask, the equip ment room men have created a new inventory sheet for each
player. The sheets specify all the player's preferences so that the correct equipment is always ready for his use. The laundering of 125 uniforms and towels after every practice
and game is handled in the Rose Center equipment room by other and game is handed in the Rose Center equipment room by othe members of the University's equipment staff. Led by senior equip-
ment manager Dan Bookey, the staff includes Roy Rudolph and Jim Powell, equipment managers, and $15-18$ student aides. Doughty has developed two techniques for speeding up work in the football equipment room. All pieces of a player's practic
uniform are laundered in a single bag, which is tagged by playe name and number. This idea speeds up the handligg of hundreds of items and minimizes the number of lost pieces. Also, every
player has in the equipment room a "game shelf" upon which is player has in the equipment room a "game shelf" upon which is stored every piece or equipment that particular player needs for
playing in a game. To pack for away games, the equipment staff merely empties each player's shelf into his respective travel bag Even with his time- and energy-saving methods, Doughty claims it takes three days to pack for game trips.
The equipment room staff works for football nearly yearhe players dhty's assistants arrive on campus one week before the players do. After the playing season is completed, the equip-
ment must be laundered, repaired, inventoried and readied fo spring practice. Once spring ball is done, the cycle is repeated in preparation for the fall season. On the days of two practices prior to the start of school and on Labor Day, the three staff members work in the equipment room
from 6 to $10 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. and from 1 to $6: 30 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. Once classes begin with from 6 to 10 a.m. and from 1 to $6: 30$ p.m. Once classes begin with a single practice each day, the equipment staff works from 1 to 6
p.m. On a home-game Saturday, they start at 10:30 a.m. and
finish finish up around $4: 30$ p.m. In addition, Doughty travels with the

role on campus, he was elected President of the Student Council. His interest in the arts and his acting talents, led to his participation in campus dramatic productions. Following graduation, and before embarking on a successful business career, Bill spent a rewarding year teaching and coaching baseball and Thumb Area of Michigan
His lifetime of civic activities and accomplishments in his home town of Muskegon, Michigan, saw him in a number of responsible and honored positions, including terms as PresYMCA, Rotary Club and Salvation Army Board. Bill served on the Board of Trustees and was for many years an inspirational lay reader of the First Congregational Church of Muskegon.

## THE BILL BOYDEN LEADERSHIP AWARD

An activity in which Bill Boyden took particular pride and toward which he directed considerable time and energy was the service to his ime member of the Central Michigan University Development Fund Board, including two terms as chairman and was again serving as vice chairman at the time of his death in April of 1980. 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## Welcome to Perry Shorts Stadium

Welcome to Perry Shorts Stadium. We hope you enjoy your visit and will return often to Central Michigan University. The following and facilities.

During football games all the seats on the east sideline (behind the
During football games all the seats on the east sideline (behind the
CMU team bench) are for the use of Central's students on a firstcome, first-served basis. The seating behind the south end zone is for general admission ticket holders and any overflow from the student seating section.
All reserved ticket seats, including season tickets, are in the west stands (behind visiting team's bench). The sections are identified by aisles, lettered A-H, with Aisle A at the north end. Rows are numbered 1-36, starting at field level. Seats 1-14 are to the left of the aisle, $15-28$ to the right.

GOLDEN SEATS
In order to stimulate fund-raising for the $\$ 1.5$ million campaign that helped pay for the stadium, a Golden Seat section was created under the press box. Tickets in this sheltered area are lettered CC, DD, EE, FF and numbered rows $37-42$. The 410 seats are sold on a who contributed $\$ 600$ per seat during the stadium building campaign.

## TICKETS

Tickets are sold Monday through Friday in the ticket office at the Dan Rose Center, adjacent to the stadium. On game days, the stadium ticket booths open at 10 a.m. General admission tickets are always sold on game days plus any unsold reserved seats. Tickets for future home games will be on sale at the stadium booths immediate after the home games. The top prices are $\$ 8$ for reserved and $\$ 5$ for the week at the Rose Center ticket office. ## EMERGENCY AID

Authorized personnel are on duty to render emergency medical treatment in the first aid room which is located behind the south concession stand under the press box. Doctors may use the telephone in the first aid room to respond to emergency calls. Central Michigan home games.
LOST AND FOUND

Lost and found items should be turned in or reported at the south concession stand during the game. After the game, CMU's public safety office, corner of East Campus Drive and Preston Street, will accept these items and reports. Individuals who are separated from'
their companions should plan on reuniting just inside the stadium's north entrances either during the halftime or immediately after the game.

Public rest rooms are available in the service buildings behind the tands on both sides of the field. The entrances to the rest rooms are on the sides away from the playing field

Pay telephones are available behind the service buildings on each side of the field.

Food, drink and souvenirs may be purchased at the concession stands at each end of the service buildings on both sides of the field. Administered by the University's Food Services, the stands are augmented by soft drink booths at the southeast and southwest corners of the stadium

CMU's football home is named after the late R. Perry Shorts, a Central alumnus who played on the 1899 team and through his industriousness and intelligence became a banking and civic leader in'
Saginaw. He established scholarships at the University in his sisters' names. As the University's oldest living football letterman, he spoke briefly but enthusiastically during the stadium dedication ceremonies in November, 1972. The Chippewas defeated Illinois State, 28-21, that day.
The stadium features the first collegiate Astro Turf playing surface in the state, has more than 20,000 permanent seats, can easily accommodate an additional 5,000 temporary bleachers and has been utilized for numerous activities in addition to football practice and games.

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MAC and PCAA Aim for California Bowl II, Dec. 18

The champions of the 1982 Mid Athletic Association will meet in the sec ond California Bowl Saturday Dec. 18, at Fresno in the 30,000 -seat Fresno State Fresno in the
University Bulldog Stadium. The inaugural California Bowl last year pitted Toledo against San Jose State in 27-25 thriller won in the closing minute by the MAC representative.

The sponsoring agency of the bowl game is the Greater San Joaquin Valley Sports Association. The Valley Children
Hospital and Guidance Clinic is the of ficial charitable beneficiary. In addition, a $\$ 100,000$ guarantee is given to each of the participating teams.
The Mizlou and ESPN television networks will televise this year's game nationally. The California Bowl II activities
will include a week of cultural and sporting events with the competing teams ar-
riving on the Sunday or Monday preceding the Bowl game.
The football-playing members of the PCAA are California State-Fullerton, California State-Long Beach, Fresno State, San Jose State, University of the Pacific, Utah State and Nevada-Las Vegas.
The nine MAC teams who do not earn their way to California Bowl II are free to sanctioned bowl game. In 1982 the PCAA is classified as NCAA Division 1-A, the MAC as Division 1-AA. CMU and Toledo are individually classified 1-A. The MAC is committed to making a determined efort to attain a 1-A classification for 1983. The ten MAC schools will each receive an allotment of bowl-game tickets, with the league champion receiving a major
share. share.

Becoming seriously involved in sports as early as junior Beconool assistant coach Don Peddie has made a career of his favorite pasttime. Peddie was awarded a football athletic scholarship upon high school graduation and was recruited as a running back by University of Miami's John Pont. Peddie spent three of his four years at that school under the direction of Bo Schembechler, who replaced Pont.

Peddie was team captain for the Miami University squad graduate assistant year and remained at the campus as a ing year.
ing year. Lining up coaching and teaching positions in Elyria, OH ., and later Brooklyn, OH., Peddie was able to expand his expertise in the field
and served as offensive backfield coach at Southwest Missouri University in Springfield for two years.
Peddie came to Central Michigan University under Roy Kramer twelve years ago to accept a combination teaching/ coaching position.
Peddie's offensive philosophy centers on maintaining
possession of the football "We want to pass when we want possession of the football. We want to pass when we want
to. We have to stretch the defense by maintaining the offensive game with a strong inside running game," he said. In the long run, Peddie's offensive goal is "keeping the defense off the field as much as possible.
To accomplish his goal, Peddie places a great deal of importance on the psychological development of his players.

The coaches have to work with the players' overall team attitude as well. "They have to be 'up' for each game," Peddie said. "None of the games can be
Peddie says that Head Coach Herb Deromedi's coaching style helps. "He's always very positive, very thorough," he said. "The coaches work together as a staff and combine their thoughts in order to put together plays we can handle.
Coming up with the winning combination goes back to recruiting techniques. "We recruit the type of offense we
want," Peddie noted. "Then when we get home with those players, we have to gear our offense to the personnel we've recruited."
Coaching has kept Don Peddie "feeling young," and sports in general seem to be a large share of his life off campus. Peddie encourages his children to participate. "There
are great carry-over values," he said. "They'll learn how to win graciously, and lose . . . with some poise.
Peddie serves on the board of the Mt. Pleasant Girls' Softball Association and spends part of each summer coaching girls' softball and Little League, in which his own children are team members.
Peddie and his wife Barbara, who teaches all styles of dance at CMU, enjoy living in Michigan and make use of wimming and waterskiing. The Peddie's have two children, Dawn, 15, and Jade, 10.
