

DRENTH WINS NOTRE DAME

Central Michigan University senior Jeff Drenth (Charlevoix) held off a late challenge by Eastern Michigan's Mark Smith to win the Notre Dame Invitational recently with a time of 24.03.

"Jeff ran a steady race. He opened up a lead at the one and three-quarters point in the race and never looked back. The rest of the field fell back when the course turned into the wind, but Jeff maintained his pace," said head coach Don Sazima.

Bowling Green won the meet with 68 points. Central's seventh place finish required 206 points. Fifteen teams took part.

Field Hockey Home, Rest Hit the Road

This coming week will be a quiet one on the home front for Central Michigan University athletic teams.

All of the Chippewa teams will be in action, but only Coach Mary Bottaro's field hockey team will do battle on campus. The CMU stickers will host the Mid-American Conference (MAC) West division playoffs on Friday and Saturday, Oct. 28-29.

Joining CMU at the Rose Field will be Eastern Michigan, Ball State and Northern Illinois. The action will start at 9:30 a.m. Friday and conclude with an 11:30 game Saturday. In all, there will be six games played.

The Chippewas who entered this week's action with a 4-6 record, will play on Friday at 11 a.m. against Northern Illinois and at 4 p.m. against Eastern Michigan. On Saturday, Central will face Ball State at 9 a.m. The top two teams will advance to the MAC championships set for Nov. 4-5.

Central Michigan's cross country teams will also be in Mid-American Conference action this weekend. Coach Don Sazima's men and Coach Vranda Barclay's women will be at Ball State in Muncie, IN., on Saturday.

Coach Marcy Weston's volleyball team started this week with an impressive 19-5 record overall and a 7-1 slate in MAC play. The Chippewas will play Toledo at 4:15 p.m. today in Rose Arena and then play at league-leading Western Michigan next Friday and at Northern Illinois on Saturday.

The Central Michigan soccer team, coached by Jim Hornak, is having its best season ever. The Chippewas were 12-1 entering a Wednesday clash with Michigan State. They were also to play Northwood Institute today at 11 a.m. on the Rose Field and will be at Ferris State Tuesday.

Bowman Gets Two Honors


For the first time in memory, the Central Michigan University coaching staff selected one player for two of the three weekly "Player of the Week" honors.


Junior safety Jim Bowman from Cadillac was tabbed the defensive and special teams "Player of the Week" following CMU's hard-earned 13-7 victory over Kent State Saturday. Junior split end John DeBoer of Grosse Pointe was named the offensive recipient.

"Jim had an excellent all-around football game for us," said CMU head coach Herb Deromedi. "He was good against the run, made a great hit at the goal line that forced a fumble and had two big interceptions.

"On the special teams, he made a TD-saving tackle on a kickoff return and then downed a punt inside Kent State's five. He did it all for us."

DeBoer caught three passes for 51 yards. "In addition to his pass interceptions, John was excellent on blocking on the outside that let us get some big runs," said Deromedi. "This was just another fine game this season for John.






DALE BENNIS - NO. 33 6-2 220 Pounds Linebacker

Dale Bennis continues to play an important part in the Central MIchigan University defense. Bennis, a two-year starter at linebacker, was all Mid-American Conference academic last year and will graduate in December with a major in Computer Science and a minor in Business Administration.

Bennis was red-shirted in 1979 and played on the 1980 MAC Championship team. He compares the current Chippewa squad to the 1980 team. "This team is scrappier, like in '80." said Bennis. "The '79 team had more ability, but this team scraps to win."

Bennis would like nothing more than to close his career with a third MAC title, and he believes the parts are there. "This team has the ability," said Bennis. "This is the closest team I've been on. The people have a lot of fun together. The last part of the season is the meat of the schedule. We're coming on strong."



MIKE MILLS - NO. 82 6-3 230 Pounds **Defensive Tackle**

Even though Mike Mills planned on making Central Michigan University his college choice, he wasn't sure if he would be playing football for the Chippewas four years ago when he graduated from Mount Pleasant Sacred Heart High School.

"I was always going to go to Central, but I didn't know if I would play because in high school I didn't know if I was good enough," Mills said. "Central offered me a scholarship and it was just an added thing for me to be playing."


Mills might have been leery of his football prowess four years ago, but it didn't take him long to jump into the thick of things. He became a starter his sophomore year and has improved steadily throughout his career to become one of the best defensive linemen in the Mid-American Conference. He had 30 tackles a year ago and thus far has 21 this season.

Mills is majoring in business with a finance emphasis and after finishing with college would like to enter some phase of the business field.

The exhilarating and truly distinctive pre-game and halftime performances of CMU's Chippewa Marching Band result from the direction of two members of the Department of Music. They are Jack Saunders, director of the marching band and associate director of bands, and John E. Williamson, director of bands. Saunders, an 18 year faculty member, plots the intricate, precision movements of the 210 member marching band. In his fifth year at CMU, Williamson is in charge of producing the exciting sound that has gained the Chippewa Marching Band such an enviable reputation through out the country.

The band's original musical arrangements are created by Paul Lavender, a CMU alumnus and professional arranger. The driving percussion section is under the leadership of Barry Bennett, Hastings junior, who is a student of Robert Hohner, percussion instructor at CMU. The honor of leading the band on the field has been bestowed upon drum major lim Batcheller, Trenton senior, who is currently in his third year as drum major.

The band's 210 members include a 28 member color guard (24 appear in performances) coordinated and choreographed by Penny Koval, Bridgeport senior, and Lissa Volz, Montrose senior.

The Mid-American Conference

Central Michigan University is one of ten major midwestern universities in Illinois, Indiana, Ohio and Michigan who have united their academic endeavors and athletic energies in the prestigious Mid-American Conference. Sister institutions Eastern Michigan and Western Michigan also belong. Northern Illinois and Ball State were added in 1973 as the MAC expanded into Indiana and Illinois. Ohio representatives include Miami University, Kent State, Bowling Green, Toledo and charter member Ohio University. The Mid-American Conference began in 1946 with five members. The 1973-74 campaign marked the first time ten schools had competed for any MAC title.

The conference headquarters is in Columbus, Ohio, in the Railroad Savings and Loan Building, 2000 West Henderson Road. Commissioner Jim Lessig, who was appointed on Nov. 1, 1982 is assisted by Harry Paidas and a secretarial staff.

The Mid-American Conference first sponsored women's championships in 1980-81. Beginning in 1982-83, the MAC sponsors eight men's and eight women's championships with the membership required to compete for six championships in each classification. The conference is classified in NCAA Division I for both men's and women's athletics. In football the MAC is listed as a Division I-AA conference but has indicated its intentions to regain I-A status. The league football champion is automatically invited to the California Bowl at Fresno, Calif., to face the Pacific Coast Athletic Association champion. All other MAC members are eligible to participate in any other bowl. The men's basketball and baseball playoff winners automatically advance to the NCAA post-season tournaments as do the volleyball and women's basketball champions.

Other conference sports include: MEN, wrestling, outdoor track, tennis, golf, swimming, and cross country; WOMEN, cross country, swimming, gymnastics, tennis, field hockey, outdoor track and softball. CMU doesn't compete in swimming.

Academic excellence is also spotlighted with the selection of a



male and female Scholar-Athlete-of-the-Year at each conference school and by the faculty athletic representatives' naming of the MAC All-Academic Teams in football, men's and women's basketball and baseball.

The MAC scholarship limit: MEN (118), football 75, basketball 15, baseball and track eight, wrestling four, golf and tennis two; WOMEN (62), track and field and cross country 13, volleyball and basketball 12, softball 11, field hockey seven, gymnastics five and tennis two.


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Welcome to Kelly/Shorts Stadium

Welcome to Kelly/Shorts Stadium. We hope you enjoy your visit and will return often to Central Michigan University. The following information is offered to assist you in utilizing the stadium's services and facilities.

SEATING

During football games all the seats on the east sideline (behind the CMU team bench) are for the use of Central's students on a firstcome, first-served basis. The seating behind the south end zone is for general admission ticket holders and any overflow from the student seating section.

All reserved ticket seats, including season tickets, are in the west stands (behind visiting team's bench). The sections are identified by aisles, lettered A-H, with Aisle A at the north end. Rows are numbered 1-36, starting at field level. Seats 1-14 are to the left of the aisle, 15-28 to the right.

GOLDEN SEATS

In order to stimulate fund-raising for the \$1.5 million campaign that helped pay for the stadium, a Golden Seat section was created under the press box. Tickets in this sheltered area are lettered CC, DD, EE, FF and numbered rows 37-42. The 410 seats are sold on a season-ticket basis only and are restricted to those CMU boosters who contributed \$600 per seat during the stadium building campaign.

TICKETS

Tickets are sold Monday through Friday in the ticket office at the Dan Rose Center, adjacent to the stadium. On game days, the stadium ticket booths open at 10 a.m. General admission tickets are always sold on game days plus any unsold reserved seats. Tickets for future home games will be on sale at the stadium booths immediately after the home games. The top prices are \$8 for reserved and \$5 for general admission. Some road game tickets can be purchased during the week at the Rose Center ticket office. For additional ticket information, call (517) 774-3041 Monday through Friday.

EMERGENCY AID

Authorized personnel are on duty to render emergency medical treatment in the first aid room which is located behind the south concession stand under the press box. Doctors may use the telephone in the first aid room to respond to emergency calls. Central Michigan Community Hospital has an ambulance crew on standby duty at all home games.

LOST AND FOUND

Lost and found items should be turned in or reported at the south concession stand during the game. After the game, CMU's public safety office, corner of East Campus Drive and Preston Street, will accept these items and reports. Individuals who are separated from their companions should plan on reuniting just inside the stadium's north entrances either during the halftime or immediately after the game.

EMERGENCY ANNOUNCEMENTS

Emergency public address announcements only should be brought to the south entrance of the press box.

REST ROOMS

Public rest rooms are available in the service buildings behind the stands on both sides of the field. The entrances to the rest rooms are on the sides away from the playing field.

PUBLIC TELEPHONES

Pay telephones are available behind the service buildings on each side of the field.

CONCESSION STANDS

Food, drink and souvenirs may be purchased at the concession stands at each end of the service buildings on both sides of the field. Administered by the University's Food Services, the stands are augmented by soft drink booths at the southeast and southwest corners of the stadium.

BACKGROUND


Central Michigan's football home took on a new name as well as a new turf this past summer. Originally called Perry Shorts Stadium when built in 1972, it now carries the name Kelly/Shorts Stadium. The stadium was named after the late R. Perry Shorts, and was changed to honor former football coach Bill Kelly.

Shorts, a CMU alumnus who played on the 1899 team and later became a banking and civic leader in Saginaw, was the university's oldest living football lettermen in '72 and gave an enthusiastic talk at the dedication ceremonies. The Chippewas then defeated Illinois State, 28-21.

Kelly, who coached 16 CMU football teams to a record of 91-58-2, led the Chippewas to five outright and two co-championships in the Interstate Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (IIAC). He retired from coaching in 1966 and is still the winningest football coach in CMU history.

Kelly/Shorts Stadium had a new AstroTurf playing surface installed over the summer, replacing the old surface that had been there since 1972. The estimated cost of the new AstroTurf was \$525,000.




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

CMU Honary Alumnus Awards Presentation

Norman Dietz Honored as 1983 Grand Marshall

Through the goal posts they swarm, double timing to a fast drum cadence. Then comes the fanfare, and from the announcer's booth: "One of the truly exciting bands in the land - the Marching Chips.

...With top musicians from 150 Michigan high schools.

And there they are -- 200 -plus of Central Michigan University" best wind and percussion students.

That showcase introduction was developed by CMU announcer Richard Allen and Norman Dietz, Central Michigan University's former director of bands.

For 32 years before his retirement in 1979, band and football fans had a chance to admire Dietz' handiwork. This year he's back again for homecoming, but not to lead the band; Dietz has been selected as the University's grand marshal.

While he acknowledges the honor, Dietz is somewhat shy about being singled out. After all, he said, his accomplishments at CMU were the result of teamwork.

"I'm a big Norm Dietz fan," said Allen. "He is one of the greatest people-managers I've ever met. He seemed to have a talent about when to come on like a ton of bricks and when to back off."

While most people saw Dietz in connection with the Marching Chips, his influence was not limited to the football field and marching. He also led the concert band, the wind ensemble and taught conducting and brass techniques. He was the manager of CMU's instrumental area. In his time at CMU, he may have worked with as many as 10,000 students.

And this from a musician who came to college with no high school music training.

"There was no public school instrumental music in my home town (Rogers City)," Dietz said. "When I was 14 I taught myself to play the trumpet."

During his student years at CMU he met and married Margaret Bush, a vocal major. After graduation in 1941 they went to Interlochen to perform and teach.

When World War II exploded, Dietz spent the next 51 months with his "dear Uncle," playing in and leading groups. When the war was finished, Dietz attended Michigan State University and earned his master's degree.

In 1946 he came to Central to take over as director of bands. At that time there were four people on the music staff and 65 students in the marching band.

"We took anyone who could hold a horn!" Dietz said.

The Marching Chips now number in excess of 200 highlytrained musicians. When Dietz retired in 1979, the music department staff had grown to 32 full-time faculty and staff. Under his leadership, the instrumental area not only grew but gained a reputation for sending out top-flight educators and players.

"I enjoyed working with the kids," Dietz said. "I was very fortunate. The administration was always helpful, we had dedicated students and a fine staff. Under those conditions your don't mind long hours - it's a labor of love."

The work was both fun and strenuous. It had to do, Dietz said, with nerves.

"There is always a feeling of apprehension before a performance. I always said that once that feeling leaves I was going to quit. It never left, and I quit anyway."

Throughout his 32-year career, Dietz pursued his goals for the University: "The name of the game is to get kids to reach a little higher than before, to always have new goals. It is a real kick to see students who develop musical experience even beyond what they dreamed could ever happen. To see them develop is the real reward."

In his retirement Dietz and his wife spend their summers in northern Michigan and their winters in Florida. Dietz plays euphonium in the Sarasota Concert Band ("I had to rejoin the union after all these years!"). In adddition to playing, he's also composing again.

"With the exception of a few pieces and plenty of arrangements for the marching band, I never really had much opportunity to write. When I retired, I started pushing a pencil."

One of his most recent works, an oratorio, "Job," is an expansion of one of his earlier works. The piece was performed at St. Bonifice Episcopal Church at Siesta Key, Fla. He's also composed a brass quintet, anthems and a new march for the Sarasota Concert Band, "The Sun Coast Festive March.

Among his other honors, Dietz was elected in 1977 to the American Bandmasters Association. Last January Dietz became the third director of bands emeritus that the MSBOA has honored with a commissioned composition. "Academic Tribute," by California's Roger Nixon, was performed (with the composer conducting) in Dietz's honor at the Midwest Conference in Ann Arbor.

"You look back on your life and realize you've been so fortunate to work with so many fine people." Dietz said. "You realize that no one is self-supporting; you're always leaning on somebody for something. I was fortunate to be a part of things here. I'm just very proud for the University. But you have to let go . . . I had my turn, but it's time to let the younger blood take over. You have to look ahead. There are so many wonderful things out there that you want to do."

Through his contact with alumni and friends living in Flint. Bennett has become involved with Central Michigan University and a strong supporter. He has received many national awards for his achievements and his company has been cited as one of the top 60 Black Businesses in the Nation in 1981 and 1982.

Rose has been called "Mr. Central Michigan Athletics." He came to Central in 1937 and began a 35 year career which took him from baseball and basketball coach to Director of Athletics.

His baseball teams posted an overall winning record, but his basketball teams became legendary. His 14-year career record of 186-64, is the best basketball record in the history of CMU. Starting with 1948-49 and 1946-49 Rose coached teams won 39 consecutive home games. The 1948-49 CMU team was rated #l of all colleges and universities in the country with a 15-1 record.

Rose was a star athlete at the University of Michigan in the 1920's and his coaching career spanned more than 43 years. He was named "Man of the Year in Michigan Athletics in 1968". The Rose Center on CMU campus is named in his honor.

Former CMU Coach Bill Kelly ...As in Kelly/Shorts Stadium

Nobody will deny the fact that Bill Kelly likes to tell stories, in fact it is part of what makes him such an interesting person.

Kelly himself admits to the charge, but he also says he has an excuse. "I guess you could say most older people like to tell a lot about what happened in the past," he said. "I've been retired since 1966 and now I have a lot of time to think about all the good things that have happened in my life."

Kelly will have another tale to tell after today's activities. The stadium was renamed in his honor to Kelly/Shorts Stadium by the CMU Board of Trustees this past summer, and he'll be honored before today's football game between Eastern Michigan and Central. He was also toasted and roasted by friends and former players at a luncheon today at the University Center billed "The Great Practice."

One of his favorite stories stems from the first time the Chippewa football team flew to play an opponent back in 1959. Kelly says the team was excited about flying out to face what was supposed to be a pretty good Drake University football team.

"Our guys were pretty fired up but when we got out there it had rained for three straight days," Kelly remembers. "The field was a mess. There must have been at least four inches of mud on the thing. It got to be Saturday morning and the rain still hadn't let up."

The situation with the field forced Kelly and his assistants to come up with an altered game plan, since they thought the game would end up to be a grinding affair.

"I decided to go with an overshift offense and send the halfback the other way with one guy blocking for him," Kelly said. "We had two pretty good halfbacks at the time in Walt Beach and Jerry O'Neill."



Well, the strategy paid off as Beach ran for 173 yards on just six carries while O'Neill rushed for 171 yards on 10 carries. The Chippewas ran up 42 points on Drake, prompting the opposing coach to vow never to play Central again, Kelly said.

"That was one of the problems we had back when I was the coach," he continued. "We were so good that no one wanted to come from far away to Mount Pleasant and play us. Nobody wants to travel very far just to get the pants beat off them."

It is almost an understatement for Kelly to say his teams were "so good", since in his 16 years at the helm the Chippewas compiled a 91-58 record making him the winningest coach in CMU history.

Before he came to CMU he also had a successful career in high school coaching. He was coach at Saginaw Arthur Hill at the time the Hillites built the first dug out high school stadium in the state. In fact, he was so proud of the stadium he used to take his CMU team over there for one game every season. It was called the Red Feather Game and the proceeds went to the stadium fund.

Kelly is a 1923 graduate of Mount Pleasant High School and a 1930 graduate of CMU. While he was a student-athlete at CMU he earned 13 letters in football, basketball, tennis and baseball. Having majored in physical education, Kelly soon learned he had ambitions to go into the coaching profession, but he never dreamed his career would become as productive as it did.

"I never really thought about it in terms of how successful I would become," he says. "I just knew it was something I really enjoyed doing, so I did it. I think if a coach has to worry about how many he is going to win or lose he is in the wrong job."

Kelly likes to tell another story about how he almost never became the coach at CMU. It all came down to the fact he was so happy with coaching at Saginaw Arthur Hill, he didn't want to make the switch.

"I got a call in 1949 by CMU and they said they wanted me to come and be the football coach. There was only one problem, they didn't want to pay me what I was making at Arthur Hill," he said. "I was supporting a family then and I needed the money so I told them no. Two years later, they called me again and offered me more money. I thought it over and decided I would take it that time.

"Everything went really well for me after I came back to CMU," he adds. "Of course we had no full rides or anything, but all the high school coaches around the state were really good to me. That made for a lot of our successs."

Although Kelly loved every minute of the time he was coaching, he also has learned to enjoy his retirement. He spends winters in Lakeland, Fla., keeping an eye on the Detroit Tigers during spring training and he also enjoys the time he spends in Mt. Pleasant, especially on football Saturdays.




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Michigan Media Provide Vital Coverage

If the first two years are any indication, the California Bowl is in for many years of fun and excitement.

Pitting the champions of the Mid-American Conference (MAC) and the Pacific Coast Athletic Association (PCAA), the California Bowl is two-for-two in thrilling football games and could be dubbed the "Cardiac Bowl." Toledo won the first contest over San Jose State, 27-25, in 1981 on a last-second field goal while Fresno State rallied from a 22-point deficit in the fourth period in 1982 to nip Bowling Green, 29-28.

California Bowl III is slated for a 1 p.m. (PST) kickoff on Dec. 17 in the 30,000-seat Bulldog Stadium on the campus of Fresno State in Fresno. The bowl is sponsored by the Greater San Joaquin Valley Sports Association, and The Valley Children's Hospital and Guidance Clinic Serves as the official charity benefitted by the game.

This year's contest will be televised by the Mizlou Television Network and will also be aired on ESPN.

The football-playing members of the PCAA are: Fullerton State, Long Beach State, Fresno State, San Jose State, Pacific, Utah State and Nevada-Las Vegas.

The nine members of the MAC which don't earn a trip to the California Bowl are free to accept a bid to any other NCAAsanctioned bowl game. Both the PCAA and the MAC are classified as 1-A conferences.

The ten MAC schools will each receive an allotment of bowl tickets, with the league champion getting a major share. Tickets may be purchased at the Rose Ticket Office at Central Michigan or from the California Bowl Headquarters at 4974 East Clinton, Suite 125, Fresno, CA 93727.

Central Michigan University will induct its first members into the newly-formed athletic "Hall of Fame" in 1984, it was announced by university officials.


Five individuals and two teams will be inducted the first two years, according to chairman Al Thomas of the physical education department.



CMU vs. Miami ...

its record would indicate." It's usually a way of pumping up a team of lesser ability.

This week, however, Central Michigan University foot-

ball coach Herb Deromedi cannot be accused of "crying wolf" when he speaks in glowing terms of the Miami University football


The Redskins of first-year coach Tim Rose sport a very uncharacteristic 1-5 record this season and 1-4 mark in the Mid-American Conference (MAC). But, Miami was picked among the conference's premier teams before the start of the season and Deromedi still sees the potential there.

"Miami opened the season against two very difficult foes in South Carolina and North Carolina." Deromedi said. "And, then it opened MAC play and has lost three games by six points. Miami very easily could be 4-0 in the MAC and battling for the championship.

As it now stands, though, it's the Chippewas of Central Michigan who are hoping to extend their win streak to six today when the two teams meet at 1:30 p.m. in a Homecoming battle at Kelly/Shorts Stadium. CMU is 4-0 im MAC action, tied for first place with Northern Illinois (CMU's opponent on Nov. 5 at home), and Toledo, and 5-1 for the season.

When it comes to talking about top players on the defensive side of the line in the MAC, everyone seems to start with Miami middle guard Brian Pillman. He's No. 41 and the 5-10, 225-pound senior has terrorized offenses throughout his career. This season, Pillman has 18 tackles for losses of 70 yards. "He's a heckuva football player," said Deromedi. "He makes things happen.

Miami's top tacklers are inside linebackers Bob Ptacek and Tim Colleran, checking in with 80 and 69 stops, respectively.

The Redskins have proven equally effective running the ball or passing it this season. Senior tailback Jay Peterson is an elusive runner, having gained 429 yards in 113 tries. Full back Phil Palcic has picked up 144 yeards in 29 tries.

Through the air, it has been the combination of sophomore Todd Rollins to sophomore Tom Murphy of Ann Arbor that has proven tough to stop. Rollins has completed 76 of 136 passes for 915 yards and four TDs. Murphy has caught 32 passes for 486 yards and three scores.

When the Redskin offense bogs down, it can always turn things over to the trusty foot of punter Steve Bumpass and his 44.1-yard average has helped Miami get out of many bad field positions.

Miami has won the last two meetings between the two schools, including a 23-0 shellacking in Oxford last season. CMU is the only MAC school, however, to hold an edge in the all-time series with the Redskins. Central has won three of the five meetings.

While Miami's offensive attack has been diversified, the Chippewas have gone primarily on the ground. And, not without good reason. Junior tailback Curtis Adams is fourth in the nation in rushing with 125.3 vards per game while the CMU team is also fourth with 294 vards an outing.

The Chippewa defense has been responsible for much of CMU's success of late, allowing four MAC opponents just 33 points. In fact, the last three teams have not reached double figures.

The linebacking crew of Mike Bevier (84 tackles) and Dale Bennis (46) have been particularly effective while outside linebacker Kevin Egnatuk has 60 stops and nine of them for 35 yards in losses. Defensive tackles Pat Brackett, Mike Mills and Greg Rehmann have made it difficult for opponents to run up the middle while Jim Bowman has been the hub of the defensive secondary.

TIM ROSE, Head Football Coach

"We were looking for a man who could not only deal with the University, but also the community," stated Miami Athletic Director Richard Shrider. "Oxford is a unique town and Miami is a unique university. We needed a man who could fit well in both situations."

Shrider went on to state: "We wanted someone who could motivate people, who is a good teacher, a salesman who can recruit and who fits the Miami image. We wanted someone who cared about his players beyond football and was interested in their total education. We found that man in Tim Rose."



8 years ago: September, 1975 Central 34, Toledo 27

Central turned in a feat rarely done by opposing schools by beating Toledo at the Glass Bowl in a high-scoring affair.

The Chippewas withstood the second half passing of All-American Gene Swick who threw for 360 yards, and nearly brought the Rockets back from a 24-7 halftime deficit.

Halfback Walt Hodges paced a balanced Chippewa attack, grinding out 157 yards on 30 carries. On the afternoon, Central rushed for 356 yards while compiling nearly 500 yards total offense.

The victory was Central's first win on the road in its new conference, the Mid-American. The win kept the Chippewas in first place and still undefeated in the MAC at 2-0-1.

During his press conference on January 5, Rose commented: "Ever since I have been coaching I have heard of people like Ewbank, Parseghian, Hayes, Pont, Schembechler, Mallory, Crum, Reed and now to be a part of that heritage puts me in a state of awe."

A native of Ohio, Rose graduated from St. Joseph High School in Cleveland and holds two degrees from Xavier University in 1963 and 1965. He served as an assistant football coach for one year at Elder High School and three at Moeller High School, both in Cincinnati. As a head football coach he served eight years at Lorain St. Mary (Lorain Catholic) High School in Lorain, Ohio and three at Boulder High School in Boulder, Colorado.

During his eight years from 1967-74 at Lorain, Rose compiled a record of 56 wins, 16 defeats and seven ties. He was selected the Ohio Class A Coach of the Year in 1967 and was voted the Conference Coach of the Year in 1967-72. His coaching record at Boulder was 19-10-1. His high school teaching assignments included English, German, religion, history, mathematics, science, health and physical education.

Rose and his wife, Joyce, have two sons and a daughter. Craig, 18, will be a freshman at Miami this fall. Kurt, 12, is a companion of his father on cross country motorcycle trips during part of July each summer. Kristine, 17, is president of the senior class at Talawanda High School and a co-captain on the varsity cheerleading team.



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


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

W.B. "BILL" BOYDEN 1911-1980

The Bill Boyden Leadership Award was established in honor and in memory of W. B. ("Bill") Boyden through a trust fund created by his family and friends. Bill Boyden was graduated from Central in 1935. Throughout his lifetime, he demonstrated a unique blend of athletic ability, leadership, concern and involvement in community activities, business acumen and participation in the arts.

During his student career at Central, Bill earned recognition for his athletic ability by being named Most Valuable Backfield Man in his senior year of varsity football and setting a Central Michigan record for the 100-yard dash in track, which he held for several years. Fulfilling a primary role on campus, he was elected President of the Student Council. His interest in the arts and his acting talents, led to his participation in campus dramatic productions.

Following graduation, and before embarking on a successful business career, Bill spent a rewarding year teaching and coaching baseball and basketball at Peck High School in the Thumb Area of Michigan.

His lifetime of civic activities and accomplishments in his home town of Muskegon, Michigan, saw him in a number of responsible and honored positions, including terms as President of the Greater Muskegon YMCA, Rotary Club and Salvation Army Board. Bill served on the Board of Trustees and was for many years an inspirational lay reader of the First Congregational Church of Muskegon.

THE BILL BOYDEN LEADERSHIP AWARD

An activity in which Bill Boyden took particular pride and toward which he directed considerable time and energy was the service to his beloved alma mater. He was a longtime member of the Central Michigan University Development Fund Board, including two terms as chairman and was again serving as vice chairman at the time of his death in April of 1980. As a member of the Development Fund Board of Directors, Bill was the motivating force in making possible the construction of the beautiful and impressive football stadium which thousands of Chippewa fans now enjoy. The reality of a major football stadium at Central Michigan University was a dream come true and a very proud moment for Bill when the facility was dedicated on November 4. 1972.

The Bill Boyden Leadership Award winner will be selected each spring from all "C" letter winners who are completing their junior year. The award will be presented at halftime of the opening home football game.

The Boyden Award seeks to honor that junior student of satisfactory academic standing who has best combined participation in a varsity intercollegiate sport with leadership ability in campus affairs and activities, interest or accomplishments in the arts and community involvement and who is and will be an exemplary representative of the University.

The recipient will receive a minimum of \$1,500, upon graduation, for continuance of education or furtherance of career goals. The

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award winner will also have his or her name inscribed on the plaque located in the Rose Arena and will also receive a permanent individual plaque.

The selection committee and Central Michigan University proudly announce that Paul Salvers of Marlette is the recipient of the third Bill Boyden Leadership Award. Paul is the son of John and Elaine Salvers, and a 1980 graduate of Sandusky High School. A political science and English major who was a National Honor Society member in high school, Salvers has a career record of 51-26-2 for the Chippewa wrestling team. The 158-pounder will serve as captain of the 1983-84 squad after finishing fourth in the '83 Mid-American Conference championships. He is also a two-time defending champion in the Muskegon Open Wrestling Tournament. Salvers also had an excellent junior year academically with a 3.31 gradepoint-average in the fall and 3.44 in the winter to raise his overall to 3.06 (4.0 scale). He hopes to pursue a career in law.

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
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
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
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Fans Invited to Sideline Luncheons

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
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

Sports medicine care and training at Central Michigan University are directed and coordinated by Ken Kopke, a 14-year member of the sports medicine staff at CMU and an active member of the National Athletic Trainers Association. The football team's training staff is led by John Mason, head men's trainer, assisted by one graduate assistant, Glenn Brickey, and five seniors: Marina Kokx, Grand Ledge; Ed Flattery, Saginaw; Jackie Bess, Battle Creek; Terry Leslie, Middleton; and Mary Manning, Pontiac.

The student football trainers undertake extensive duties, including pre-practice and pre-game tapings, conditioning rehabilitation and post-injury care, creation of pads for protecting injuries, paperwork on injury treatment, therapy and followup.

During games, the trainers are responsible for "sideline care," anticipating the needs of Mason in injury situations, checking on player injuries and providing fluids and foods like oranges, Chip-ade and soft drinks.

Thomas M. Keating, M.D., and orthopaedic surgeon in Mt. Pleasant since 1975, is team physician for all men's and women's athletic squads. He is a member of the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons and the American Orthopaedic Society for Sports Medicine. He holds an A.B. degree in history from Georgetown University and an M.D. degree from the University of Michigan. He trained in orthopaedics at the U-of-M Medical Center, and was an instructor in orthopaedics at the U-of-M Medical School.

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

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Ray Bentley Wins Inaugural Jefferson Award

Ray Bentley, the Central Michigan linebacker who led the Mid-American Conference in tackles in 1982, was named the MAC's football Player of the Year and first recipient of the Jefferson Trophy, a glass-sculpture emblematic of the award. Bentley, a member of the USFL-champion Michigan Panthers, was honored last December at the MAC's first Player of the Year banquet sponsored in Toledo by the Downtown Athletic Club of Toledo. Bentley was chosen by a 30-person panel consisting of the MAC's ten football coaches and selected media who regularly cover MAC football

The 6-2, 220-pound senior from Hudsonville, Michigan, recorded 66 solo tackles and 107 assists for a total of 173 tackles and an average of 15.7 per game to lead the conference. He was largely the reason Central Michigan led the league in defense against the run, allowing just 99.4 yards-per-game. He also had five interceptions.

Bentley was chosen from a field of ten nominees as each MAC coach in conjunction with his team nominated a player from the team. The nominees were: Kelly George, Ball State; Andre Young, Bowling Green; Bill Rush, Eastern Michigan; Mike Moeller, Kent State; Brian Pillman, Miami; Max Gill, Northern Illinois; Don Harrison, Ohio; Jim Kelso, Toledo; Mark Kujacznski, Western Michigan; and Bentley,


CMU's football team depends on the equipment staff a great deal. Since the team numbers approximately 125 players, and each player has 15-20 pieces of equipment, there are 2,500 pieces to be inventoried, laundered, repaired, stored, packed for away games and replaced on the player's shelf. The equipment includes shirts, pants, socks, shoes, supporters, helmets, knee pads, thigh pads, hip pads, shoulder pads, elbow pads, hand pads and gloves.

The laundering of 125 uniforms and towels after every practice and game is handled in the Rose Center equipment room by other members of the University's equipment staff. Led by senior equipment manager Dan Bookey, the staff includes Roy Rudolph and Jim Powell, equipment managers, and 15-18 student aides.

The equipment room staff works for football nearly yearround. Doughty's assistants arrive on campus one week before the players do. After the playing season is completed, the equipment must be laundered, repaired, inventoried and redied for spring practice. Once spring ball is done, the cycle is repeated in preparation for the fall season.

Doughty also travels with the team to away games to ensure the safe arrival back at Kelly/Shorts Stadium of the 800 pieces of equipment that went on the road.



With first place at stake and an overflow crowd of 24,382 on Homecoming, the Chippewas took over sole possession of the lead in the MAC with a convincing 42-18 victory over upsetminded Ohio U.

On the very next play, Curtis Adams electrified the crowd with a 78-yard touchdown gallop to put the game away.

Adams finished this brilliant day with four touchdowns, and 237 yards on the ground in 27 carries.

CHIPPEWAS 'PLAYERS OF THE WEEK'

For the second time this season, senior punter Dan Cawthorne (Arlington Heights, IL) and junior tailback Curtis Adams (Muskegon) were selected "Players of the Week" by the Central Michigan University football coaching staff.

Senior linebacker Dale Bennis (Flint) was also selected following CMU's 14-9 victory over Ohio University Saturday in Athens, OH.

Adams rushed for 197 yards in 32 carries and scored both Chippewa TDs on runs of four and five yards. "Curtis had another outstanding game for us," said CMU Coach Herb Deromedi. "He showed both inside and outside running abilities."

Cawthorne punted eight times for a 36.6 average which would have been much higher except for a short punt near the Ohio goal line. "Dan did a good job of keeping Ohio out of good field position with high kicks that we could cover," said Deromedi.

Bennis was credited with three solo and nine assisted tackles in playing his best game of the season. Dale was very active and came up with a number of key plays," Deromedi said. "He has really come on strong for us ever since the Western Michigan game. He's just getting better and better.

Adams Picked Mac's Best

For the second time in his career, Central Michigan University junior tailback Curtis Adams (Muskegon) has been selected the Mid-American Conference offensive "Player of the Week."

Adams, who garnered the award as a sophomore, gained 197 yards in 32 carries in CMU's 14-9 victory over Ohio University Saturday. He scored both touchdowns on runs of four and five yards.

Adams is now fourth in the nation in rushing with an average of 125.3 yards per game.

Chippewa Men and Women Open Cage Drills

With its sights set on bigger and better things to come in the 1983-84 season, the Central Michigan University women's basketball team began practice Monday, Oct. 17.

Third-year head coach Laura Golden will be putting her troops through early season workouts in preparation for one of the toughest schedules in the team's history.

The Chippewas will be facing such opponents as Michigan, Michigan State, Minnesota, Notre Dame, Purdue and the University of Detroit, all before another tough round of Mid-American Conference play.

"That is one of the things we learned last season at the NCAA Tournament," Golden said. "We knew we would have to play tougher competition throughout the season to get us ready for post-season play." CMU lost to Maryland 94-71 in the first round of the tournament in 1983.

One of the biggest tasks Golden will have is figuring out which five players will start once the season rolls around. She will also need to find replacements for last season's graduation loss of Lisa Zodtner and Terri McFarland.

Two of the players Golden will be looking at in particular are Flint junior guard Sylvia Odom and Flushing sophomore guard Kathy LaBarge. Odom will be looked upon to fill the gap at shooting guard, while LaBarge is expected to fill the point guard position.

Another sophomore from Flint, Latanga Cox, is expected to have an equally impressive second season after averaging 9.1 points and 8.8 rebounds in 1982-83 at the center position. Kaleva sophomore forward Betsy Yonkman was a standout coming off the bench last season, but this year will see time as a starter. She averaged 7.4 points and 5.2 rebounds a year ago even though she never started a game.

Golden will also rely on seniors Patty Weidman a center from Plymouth and Denise Tower, a forward from Windsor, Ont. Tower enters the season among the career CMU scoring leaders. Other returnees are Columbia City, Ind. sophomore Trisha Phillips and Hartland junior Chris Magnant.

Golden forsees no drastic changes to the style of play which guided the Chippewas to a 21-9 record a year ago. "We are going to make one change in our press offense, but other than that things will be pretty much the same," she said.

The Chippewas will take on the University of Windsor in an exhibition contest Nov. 14, and will open the official season with a trip to the Nebraska Invitational Nov. 25-26. by Mike Smith

You definitely will need a program at Central Michigan University men's basketball games this season in order to tell the players.

No fewer than eight of the 14 basketball hopefuls that veteran Coach Dick Parfitt were welcomed to the Oct. 15 opening of practice were not on the team when the 1982-83 season closed with a 10-17 mark.

Four of the newcomers are freshmen, two transfers, one a redshirt and another who missed the end of last season with injury.

To all of this, Parfitt said, "We should be refreshingly unpredictable.'

Gone from last year's team, of course, is all-time leading scorer and crowd favorite, Melvin "Sugar" McLaughlin, who's currently

nar and guard John Coe, elected not to come back "We have so many new faces on this year's team that we'll have to spend a good deal of time just establishing who will play what position," said Parfitt, who enters his 13th season with a career mark of

173-145. "We'll end up finding our top five players and then find the best position for them." Two players who do know what position they'll play are point guard Peter Lambropoulos (Windsor, Ont., sophomore) and center

Kim Thompson (Flint, senior). Whether or not they start, however, depends on what transpires in the six weeks leading up to the Nov. 25 season opener against highly-rated Michigan State in the Cutlass Classic.

Also returning from last years's team are senior Rob Koch (Kenton, OH) and juniors Derek Boldon (Port Huron), James Mitchell (Barberton, OH) and Jeff Heide (Lake Odessa). Senior Glenn Cross (Pontiac) played for CMU in the first five games last year but missed the remainder of the season with knee surgery. He's on the roster this season.

Junior Anthony Scott (Grand Rapids) was out last year as a redshirt and figures to battle his way into the playing picture this season.

Of the new faces Chippewa fans will likely see, sophomore Greg Washington (Detroit) is easily the most noticeable and may be the best. He's a 6-2 transfer from the University of Michigan who packs 210 pounds on his frame, and is an explosive jumper and gritty competitor. The other transfer is junior Steve Schmidt (Lansing) who played for two years at Palm Valley CC in Saratoga, CA.

Parfitt and his staff are proud of the four freshmen that comprise CMU's recruiting class from last fall and winter. Foremost among them is Class A unanimous all-stater Dan Majerle (6-foot-6, 205 pounds) of Traverse City. He will start the practice season sidelined with a back ailment, though, and may not play all season.

The other frosh are 6-7 Eric Nordmann (Williamston), 6-7 Jeff Bellamy (Davison) and 6-5 James Murray (Detroit).

"I think this team will be more competitive than some we've had in the past and I think hard work will be a trademark of this group," said Parfitt. "I'm sure you'll find us a little better defensively and much more balanced on offense."

Formed in 1903, this is the 80th year of the Scottville Clown Band that was called the Scottville Ladies Band when it was formed. It then became known as the Scottville Merchants and in 1920 became the "Clown Band," incorporating as a non-profit group in 1975.


