AROUND THE MAC

The Mid-American Conference schedule features nothing but

intra-league match-ups for the first time of the season today.

Despite its tie with winless Eastern Michigan last Saturday night, Central Michigan finds itself in a three-way tie for the top league spot with today's guest Ohio University and Toledo. Ohio was idle last week and has had two weeks to prepare for today's tilt. In OU's previous game to this, it sprung an upset of sorts tying Toledo 16-16.

Toledo, meanwhile, must travel to Oxford, Ohio to take on a hungry Miami team that knocked off Kent State 19-3 on the road last Saturday. The Rockets' defense has been extraordinary so far this season, but this Ohio rivalry always brings out the best in both squads. A Miami win would also vault the Redskins back into the league championship race with a 2-2 record.

Elsewhere, the Chippewas hope Western Michigan will get back into its winning ways when it travels to face Bowling Green today. A Western win would give each team two league losses and open things up a bit for CMU. Last Saturday the Broncos dropped a tough 20-15 decision to Northern Illinois in

Eastern Michigan has gained a great measure of respectability within the league on the basis of its performances against CMU and Bowling Green the past two weekends. Today, the Hurons will attempt to break a 15-game winless string by taking on a "hard to figure" Northern Illinois team that beat Western Michigan on the road last Saturday after dropping a home contest to Ball State the week before.

Additionally, Kent State will try and escape the league cellar when it travels to Muncie, Ind. to take on Ball State. Both teams are coming off dismal efforts from a week ago. The Golden Flashes were thrashed 19-3 in their own back yard by Miami while the Cardinals took a 34-6 beating from Indiana State.

CHIP NOTES

We have numbers, numbers and more numbers in our Chip Notes column this

Senior split end John DeBoer went over the 1,000-yard mark in career receiving yardage when he caught six aerials for 102 yards last Saturday night against Eastern Michigan. On the year, he has 20 catches for 429 yards and a league-leading 21.5 yards per catch average. He shows career totals of 1,079 yards on 47 receptions for a 23.0 average and 10 touchdowns

Despite nagging injuries, senior tailback Curtis Adams is having a solid season statistics-wise. Curtis has lugged the ball 83 times for 505 yards and has moved into third place on the all-time MAC rushing list with 3,463 yards. Only two MAC players have ever hit the 3,500 yard mark; Jerome Persell of Western Michigan (1976-78) totalled 4,190 and Northern Illinois' Allen Ross (1977-80) gathered 3,500 even.

Adams scored two more TD's last Saturday to give him 36 for his career and sole possession of second place in the CMU record. He trails only Jim Podoley (1953, 55-56), who hit paydirt 51 times. Curtis has 34 career rushing touchdowns, five short of the MAC record of 39 set by Persell and Bowling Green's Dave Preston (1973-76). Senior quarterback Bob DeMarco is also making his mark in the Central records section. He leads the conference in passing efficiency based on his 35 completions in 60 attempts for 559 yards and four touchdowns. He now has 2,831 career passing yards, good for fourth on the all-time CMU career list. With 169 yards today he would become the fourth Central QB to chalk up 3,000 passing yards. Ahead of DeMarco are Pat Boyd (1962-65) with 3,200; Andy MacDonald (1950-51) with 3,137; and Gary Hogeboom (1976-79) with 3,088.

DeMarco's 383 passing attempts ties him with MacDonald for second all-time and he became the fourth CMU quarterback to go over 200 completions (he has 201) last Saturday against EMU. Seven more completions will tie him with Hogeboom for third.

Senior free safety Jim Bowman snared his second interception of the season last Saturday versus EMU. He now has 15 for his career and is tied with Jamie Gent (1962-65) for the top spot in the CMU record book.

Senior linebacker Mike Bevier has 68 tackles to lead the team coming into this game and he boasts a career total of 267. Only five Chippewas have collected 300 career tackles including the alltime leader Ray Bentley (1979-82), who registered 443.

JIM BOWMAN - NO. 48 205 Pounds **Free Safety**

It was during the summer of 1981 when Jim Bowman started preparing himself for a football career at Central Michigan. Cadillac High's all-state running back wanted to make sure he would be ready for the challenge of collegiate football.

"The funny thing is, I went through that whole summer thinking I'd be a runner when I got here. So, I was always practicing for that, working on stances by myself as a running back or tailback," Bowman said.

It is four years later, and the 6-2, 205-pound senior has racked up exactly zero yards rushing for CMU. If all goes well, however, Bowman will find a spot in the CMU record book at the top of the career interception list by the end of the season.

"I didn't find out until my first day here that they wanted me to play defense. Coach Deromedi told me I had the choice of being a second-string safety or fourth-string running back. I took second string safety," Bowman recalled.

To this day, neither he, nor the coaching staff regrets it. Bowman became a starter his sophomore year, and last year picked off a CMU-record eight passes, good for third in the nation among returning players. Going into the Eastern Michigan contest a week ago, his 14 career interceptions put him one shy of Jamie Gent's career record of 15 thefts.

"To tell you the truth, I wasn't really happy (with 1983). I must have dropped at least five sure interceptions and I didn't get one until about the sixth game (actually the fourth vs. Kent State). But, to come on strong at the end like I did was encouraging," Bowman said.

The switch from star high school running back was made with little difficulty, despite the fact Bowman had played defense just "a couple of times" in high school simply to "fill up space and be the 11th man."

"The biggest concern is you have to learn to dish out the punishment instead of taking it. It just took awhile to sink in that my job was defense, not offense, and accepting that was the toughest part. But I've learned to love the free safety position,"

His performance reflects his desire for the game. After earning second-team all-Mid-American Conference honors in '82, Bowman became a member of the conference's first-team in '83.

Bowman's talents have not gone unnoticed by the professional scouts, either. He is considered a top prospect and is hoping to begin a professional football career after graduation. Bowman also is looking for the possible football career to open a door in the business field, as he would like to become involved in sales.

A very personable guy off the field, Bowman said he likes to meet people and travel a lot, thus the pursuit of a business career. But, he likes to meet people in a different way on the field. His 87 tackles a year ago ranked third on the team.

"I enjoy hitting people the most. Off the field, I'm a little quieter than on the field. Sometimes I start to lose my mind on the field and start saying or doing things I wouldn't dream of doing off the field. My intensity definitely picks up on the field, Bowman said.

If there is one thing left for Bowman to do here, it is the task of erasing his most memorable moment.

"I guess the worst moment sticks out most in my mind — the loss to Bowling Green last year. It was a very emotional loss for the team and it was like the whole season fell through at that point. Everybody remembers that, and hopefully it will make us pull together and work harder to fulfill our dreams of getting to California this year," Bowman said.

Mr. Loomis died on Nov. 15, 1982 at the age of 73. Today, CMU will honor his wife, Opal, with a plaque commemorating his inspirational support of Central Michigan University.

Composition of "Central's Fight Song" was just one of the results of Mr. Loomis' dual love of music and CMU. While at Central, he was both head cheerleader and band drum major, providing him with some busy Saturday autumn afternoons.

Mr. Loomis wrote the fight song while he was a student. The song was performed for the first time at the 1934 homecoming

After earning his bachelor's and master's degrees from Central, he taught and coached at Grand Blanc and Ainsworth high schools in Flint and was athletic director at Beecher High School,

His work in the Genesee County chapter of CMU's Alumni Association earned him the "Chapter President Award" in

In May 1972 he was presented the "Distinguished Leadership Citation," which described him as "the personification of school spirit in his years at Central" and lauded his activities as an alumnus of the university.

Mr. Loomis' other accomplishments included membership in the High School Coaches Hall of Fame, past presidency of the Sports Sages and past presidency of the Michigan Shuffleboard

Opal Loomis was a member of the university staff for 18 years, serving as director of health services. She was a faculty adviser of the Booster Club and was the first woman appointed to the university Athletic Committee.


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
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Welcome to Kelly/Shorts Stadium

Welcome to Kelly/Shorts Stadium. We hope you enjoy your visit and will return often to Central Michigan University. The following information is offered to assist you in utilizing the stadium's services and facilities.

SEATING

During football games all the seats on the east sideline (behind the CMU team bench) are for general admission use on a first-come, first-served basis. The seating behind the south end zone is for general admission ticket holders and any overflow from the student

All reserved ticket seats, including season tickets, are in the west stands (behind visiting team's bench). The sections are identified by aisles, lettered A-N, with Aisle A at the north end. Rows are numbered 1-36, starting at field level. Seats 1-14 are to the left of the aisle, 15-28 to the right.

GOLDEN SEATS RESERVED

In order to stimulate fund-raising for the \$1.5 million campaign that helped pay for the stadium, a Golden Seat section was created under the press box. Tickets in this sheltered area are lettered CC, DD, EE, FF and numbered rows 37-42. The 410 seats are sold on a season-ticket basis only and are restricted to those CMU boosters who contributed \$600 per seat during the stadium building cam-

TICKETS

Tickets are sold Monday through Friday in the ticket office at the Dan Rose Center, adjacent to the stadium. On game days, the stadium ticket booths open at 10 a.m. General admission tickets are always sold on game days plus any unsold reserved seats. Tickets for future home games will be on sale at the stadium booths immediately after the home games. The top prices are \$8 for reserved and \$5 for general admission. Some road game tickets can be purchased during the week at the Rose Center ticket office. For additional ticket information, call (517) 774-3045 Monday through Friday.

EMERGENCY AID

Authorized personnel are on duty to render emergency medical treatment in the first aid room which is located behind the south concession stand under the press box. Doctors may use the telephone in the first aid room to respond to emergency calls. Central Michigan Community Hospital has an ambulance crew on standby duty at all home games.

LOST AND FOUND

Lost and found items should be turned in or reported at the south concession stand during the game. After the game, CMU's public safety office, corner of East Campus Drive and Preston Street, will accept these items and reports. Individuals who are separated from their companions should plan on reuniting just inside the stadium's north entrances either during the halftime or immediately after the

EMERGENCY ANNOUNCEMENTS

Emergency public address announcements only should be brought to the south entrance of the press box.

REST ROOMS

Public rest rooms are available in the service buildings behind the stands on both sides of the field. The entrances to the rest rooms are on the sides away from the playing field.

PUBLIC TELEPHONES

Pay telephones are available behind the service buildings on each side of the field.

CONCESSION STANDS

Food, drink and souvenirs may be purchased at the concession stands at each end of the service buildings on both sides of the field. Administered by the University's Food Services, the stands are augmented by soft drink booths at the southeast and southwest corners of the stadium.


KELLY/SHORTS STADIUM HISTORY

Kelly/Shorts Stadium, the home of Central Michigan University football, opened in 1977.


The stadium was originally named Shorts Stadium in honor of R. Perry Shorts, a 1900 graduate of Central Michigan, who went on to a distinguished banking career in Saginaw.

In June of 1983, the CMU Board of Trustees voted to rename the stadium Kelly/Shorts Stadium in honor of Kenneth (Bill) Kelly. Kelly coached the Chippewa football team from 1951 to 1966. Compiling a record of 91-58-2, he is the winningest football coach in CMU

The stadium received a facelift of sorts prior to the 1983 season as a new wall-to-wall Astro Turf playing surface was installed to replace the surface that had covered the stadium floor since the 1972 opening. Half of the cost of the \$525,000 Astro Turf carpet came from private donations.



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
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Michigan Media Provide Vital Coverage

The success that Central Michigan University's athletic teams have enjoyed in the Mid-American Conference (MAC) by relying primarily on Michigan high school talent helped create strong media interest in the Chippewas throughout the state. The Mid-American Conference

Central Michigan University is one of ten major mid-western universities in Illinois, Indiana, Ohio and Michigan who have united their academic endeavors and athletic energies in the prestigious Mid-American Conference. Sister institutions Eastern Michigan and Western Michigan also belong. Northern Illinois and Ball State were added in 1973 as the MAC expanded into Indiana and Illinois. Ohio representatives include Miami University, Kent State, Bowling Green, Toledo and charter member Ohio University. The Mid-American Conference began in 1946 with five members. The 1973-74 campaign marked the first time the schools had competed for any MAC title.

The conference headquarters is located in Toledo, Ohio. The address is Four Seagate, Suite 501, Toledo, OH 43604. The league commissioner is lim Lessig, who was appointed on Nov. 1, 1982 and is assisted by Allan

The Mid-American Conference first sponsored women's championships in 1980-81. Beginning in 1982-83, the MAC sponsors eight men's and eight women's championships with the membership required to compete for six championships in each classificiation. The conference is classified in NCAA Division I for both men's and women's athletics. In football the MAC is listed as a Division I-A. The league football champion is automatically invited to the California Bowl at Fresno, Calif., to face the Pacific Coast Athletic Association champion. All other MAC members are eligible to participate in any other bowl. The men's basketball and baseball playoff winners automatically advance to the NCAA post-season tournaments as do the volleyball and women's basketball

Other conference sports include: MEN, wrestling, outdoor track, tennis, golf, swimming, and cross country; WOMEN, cross country, swimming, gymnastics, tennis, field hockey, outdoor track and softball. CMU doesn't compete in swimming.

Academic excellence is also spotlighted with the selection of a male and female Scholar-Athlete-of-the-Year at each conference school and by the faculty athletic representatives' naming of the MAC All-Academic Teams in football, men's and women's basketball and baseball

The sports with set scholarship limits for men are football (80), basketball (15), baseball and track (eight each), wrestling golf and tennis (two each). 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MAC, PCAA TEAMS SET SIGHT ON FOURTH CALIFORNIA BOWL



The Fresno State University Bulldogs Stadium is the site of the annual California Bowl, scheduled for December 15 this year, which will feature a highly-competitive game between the champions of the Mid-American Conference and the Pacific Coast Athletic Association.

If the first three years are any indication, the Fourth California Bowl should be an excitement-filled affair.

Pitting the champions of the Mid-American Conference (MAC) and the Pacific Coast Athletic Association (PCAA), the California Bowl is three-for-three in thrilling football games. Toledo won the first contest over San Jose State, 27-25, in 1981 while Fresno State rallied for 22 points in the fourth quarter to nip Bowling Green in the 1982 game, 29-28. Last season Northern Illinois posted a 20-13 triumph over Fullerton State, but had to thwart a late drive to preserve the victory.

The California Bowl is played in Bulldog Stadium on the campus of Fresno State in Fresno. A total of 66,029 fans have witnessed the first three games.

The 1984 contest, sponsored by the Greater SanJoaquin Valley Sports Association, has been scheduled for Dec. 15.

California Bowl activities include a weeklong schedule for the competing teams with the Valley Children's Hospital and Guidance Clinic the official charity benefited by the game.

The football-playing members of the PCAA are: Fullerton State, Long Beach State, Fresno State, San Jose State, Pacific, Utah State and Nevada-Las Vegas.

The nine members of the MAC which don't earn a trip to the California Bowl are free to accept a bid to any other NCAA sanctioned bowl game. Both the MAC and the PCAA are classified as 1-A conferences.

Allen Returns as Public Address Voice

Dr. Richard K. (Dick) Allen of CMU's Speech and Dramatic Arts faculty returns to the Kelly/Shorts Stadium's public address system for his seventh year as full-time announcer this football season.

An avid Chippewa fan himself, Allen is known as the "Voice of the Marching Chippewa Band." For several years he has been the announcer for the band's pre-game and halftime performances at football games.

Also, Allen announces for CMU basketball games in the Rose Center and for baseball games at Alumni Field.

Allen has an appreciation for the struggles of CMU athletes since he is a long-distance runner. Running 6 to 10 miles daily, he has participated in many Michigan running events.

CMU vs....

Anyone for a 16-16 tie today?

You can bet that the members of the Ohio University (2-2-1) and Central Michigan University (4-0-1) football teams would cast loud dissenting votes as both squads have been that route this season.

In fact, in the last game for both schools, the final result was a 16-16 deadlock. And that has been the only blemish on an otherwise perfect Mid-American Conference (MAC) schedule.

Coach Brian Burke's Bobcats battled Toledo to a 16-all standoff two weeks ago, and then took last Saturday off. Coach Herb Deromedi's Chippewas tied Eastern Michigan last week.

So, after three games of MAC action, there's a logiam at the top with a trio of teams tied for first with 2-0-1 marks, including today's combatants. Toledo is also at 2-0-1.

"It just goes to show you how balanced and tough our conference is," said Deromedi. "We have five teams within one-half game of each other and nobody has a perfect record."

Two years ago, CMU and Ohio met on the same field with the MAC lead hanging in the balance and the Chippewas won, 42-18. Both teams were tied for the MAC lead

However, don't look for anything quite so easy this time around.

"Ohio is the best defensive team we've faced this year," said Deromedi. "It's a veteran team that loves to hit and surround the ball. Two weeks ago, it completely shut down Toledo's running game."

Deromedi pointed to Ohio's linebacking corps of Tom Kennedy, Mike Mangen and Brian Mays as being outstanding along with 6-1, 235-pound middle guard Sherman Carter. Offensively, Deromedi has been impressed with the play of quarterback Dennis Swearingen, who



This season, he's thrown 96 times and completed 60 for a sparkling 62.5 percent and 670 yards.

"He has a real nice touch on the ball," Deromedi said.

Swearingen's primary receivers have been Tom Compernolle (19 for 246 yards) and Bill Seder (16 for 221). When the Bobcats decide to stick to

the ground, Glenn Hunter is a solid runner with 346 yards in 94 tries. Jesse Owens is a promising backup who has missed the last two games but still has 116 yards in 32 attempts.

Ohio got off to a miserable start, falling at West Virginia, 38-0, and North Carolina State, 43-6. Since then, the Bobcats stopped Ball State, 31-17, and Eastern Michigan, 16-13, before the Toledo tie.

The Chippewas still hold an eight-game streak without suffering a loss, but the CMU training room has been getting a big workout in recent weeks trying to keep the team taped together.

Key starters Ron Fillmore, Kevin Egnatuk and Mike Brunner were lost earlier in the fall while starting defen-

sive tackle Greg Rehmann (ankle) and ace tailback Curtis Adams (thigh bruise) were injured at EMU and listed as doubtful for today. Special teams standout Aubrey Wade injured his leg at EMU and is out indefinitely.

John DeBoer continues to sparkle as a wide receiver for CMU, grabbing six for 106 vards versus Eastern. He's tops on CMU with 20 catches for 429 yards. His 21.5-yards per catch leads the MAC.

DeBoer earned CMU "Player of the Week" honors after EMU as did ever-steady defensive tackle Pat Brackett and walk-on punter Brian McPherson from Traverse City. Interestingly, McPherson played tackle in high school and current Chippewa guard Terry Goodell played tight end.

More than 17,000 homecoming fans looked on in Athens, Ohio last year as the Chippewas ruined the day's festivities by defeating the Bobcats 14-9.

Once again it was a tough CMU defense that kept the Chippewas in the game. The men in the trenches held the Bobcats to under 200 yards total offense.

The injury-riddled Chips were led by tailback Curtis Adams who rushed for 197 yards and two touchdowns in 32 carries. (At that time in the season, Adams was the nation's fourth leading rusher with an average of 125.3 yards per game.) 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

W.B. "BILL" BOYDEN 1911-1980

The Bill Boyden Leadership Award was established in honor and in memory of W. B. ("Bill") Boyden through a trust fund created by his family and friends. Bill Boyden was graduated from Central in 1935. Throughout his lifetime, he demonstrated a unique blend of athletic ability, leadership, concern and involvement in community activities, business acumen and participation in the arts.

During his student career at Central, Bill earned recognition for his athletic ability by being named Most Valuable Backfield Man in his senior year of varsity football and setting a Central Michigan record for the 100-yard dash in track, which he held for several years. Fulfilling a primary role on campus, he was elected president of the Student Council. His interest in the arts and his acting talents, led to his participation in campus dramatic productions.

Following graduation, and before embarking on a successful business career, Bill spent a rewarding year teaching and coaching baseball and basketball at Peck High School in the Thumb Area of Michigan.

His lifetime of civic activities and accomplishments in his home town of Muskegon, Michigan, saw him in a number of responsible and honored positions, including terms as President of the Greater Muskegon YMCA, Rotary Club and Salvation Army Board. Bill served on the Board of Trustees and was for many years an inspirational lay reader of the First Congregational Church of Muskegon.

THE BILL BOYDEN LEADERSHIP AWARD

An activity in which Bill Boyden took particular pride and toward which he directed considerable time and energy was the service to his beloved alma mater. He was a longtime member of the Central Michigan University Development Fund Board, including two terms as chairman and was again serving as vice chairman at the time of his death in April of 1980. As a member of the Development Fund Board of Directors, Bill was the motivating force in making possible the construction of the beautiful and impressive football stadium which thousands of Chippewa fans now enjoy. The reality of a major football stadium at Central Michigan University was a dream come true and a very proud moment for Bill when the facility was dedicated on November 4, 1972.

The Bill Boyden Leadership Award winner will be selected each spring from all "C" letter winners who are completing their junior year. The award will be presented at halftime of the opening home football game.

The Boyden Award seeks to honor that junior student of satisfactory academic standing who has best combined participation in a varsity intercollegiate sport with leadership ability in campus affairs and activities, interest or accomplishments in the arts and community involvement and who is, and will be, an exemplary representative of the University.

The recipient will receive a minimum of \$1,500, upon graduation, for continuance of education or furtherance of career goals. The

award winner will also have his or her name inscribed on the plaque located in the Rose Arena and will also receive a permanent individual plaque.

The selection committee and Central Michigan University proudly announce that Kevin Egnatuk of East Lansing is the recipient of the fourth Bill Boyden Leadership Award. Kevin has earned three letters at CMU and is considered one of the Chippewas' top returners for the 1984 season. In 1983 he earned All-Mid-American Conference first-team honors at defensive end as he collected 66 solo and 46 assisted tackles for 112 total. He also registered 23 tackles that resulted in 123 yards of losses for the opponents.

Kevin has also been a shining example in the classroom. He holds a 3.75 grade point average (4.0 possible) in finance and earned a first-team berth on the MAC all-academic unit as well in 1983 after gaining an honorable mention in 1982. Egnatuk was also lauded nationally for his academic efforts with a second-team spot on the College Sports Information Directors' Academic All-America squad.

Kevin is the son of Tony and Virginia Egnatuk and a 1981 graduate of East Lansing High School.

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
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
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Fans Invited to Sideline Luncheons



Sports Medicine Staff Performs Integral Role

The football team's training staff is led by head men's trainer John Mason and assistant athletic trainer Greg McGillvary. Aiding the professional staff are students Barb Marshburn, Portage; Lynn Mathia, Livonia; Chris Peterson, Gladstone; Lynn Morley, St. Clair Shores; Bill Childs, Plymouth; and Kevin Harmon, Au Train.

The student football trainers undertake extensive duties, including pre-practice and pre-game tapings, conditioning rehabilitation and post-injury care, creation of pads for protecting injuries, paperwork on injury treatment, therapy and followup.

During games, the trainers are responsible for "sideline care," anticipating the needs of Mason in injury situations, checking on player injuries and providing fluids and foods like oranges, Chip-ade and soft drinks.

Thomas M. Keating, M.D., and orthopaedic surgeon in Mt. Pleasant since 1975, is team physician for all men's and women's athletic squads. He is a member of the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons and the American Orthopaedic Society for Sports Medicine. He holds an A.B. degree in history from Georgetown University and an M.D. degree from the University of Michigan. He trained in orthopaedics at the U-of-M Medical Center, and was an instructor in orthopaedics at the U-of-M Medical School.

Sports medicine care and training at Central Michigan University are directed and coordinated by Ken Kopke, a

15-year member of the sports medicine staff at CMU and an active member of the national Athletic Trainers Association.

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
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



EQUIPMENT ROOM PERSONNEL BOASTS EXPERIENCE

Louie Doughty, a member of the Central Michigan University family since 1969, manages the Kelly/Shorts Stadium football equipment room. He is assisted by junior Jeff Parker of Lake City, now in his third year, Carl Sztuczko, a Saginaw senior in his second season and Scottville junior Scott Dumas, who joins the staff for the first time in 1984.

CMU's football team depends on the equipment staff a great deal. Since the team numbers approximately 125 players, and each player has 15-20 pieces of equipment, there are 2,500 pieces to be inventoried, laundered, repaired, stored, packed for away games and replaced on the player's shelf. The equipment includes shirts, pants, socks, shoes, supporters, helmets, knee pads, thigh pads, hip pads, shoulder pads, elbow pads, hand pads and gloves.

The laundering of 125 uniforms and towels after every practice and game is handled in the Rose Center equipment room by other members of the University's equipment staff. Directed by Dan Bookey, coordinator of equipment operations, the staff includes Roy Rudolph and Jim Powell, equipment managers and 15-18 student aides.


The equipment room staff works for football nearly yearround. Doughty's assistants arrive on campus one week before the players do. After the playing season is completed, the equipment must be laundered, repaired, inventoried and prepped for spring practice. Once spring ball is done, the cycle is repeated in preparation for the fall season.

Doughty also travels with the team to away games to ensure the safe arrival back at Kelly/Shorts Stadium of the 800 pieces of equipment that went on the road.

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
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TED HOLLERN — NO. 23 5-7 175 Pounds Swing Back

At 5-7, and 175 pounds, Central Michigan University's Ted Hollern looks more suited to sitting in front of a computer terminal or opening a meeting in a business suit. But despite his size, Hollern is more likely to be seen suited up in a Central Michigan University football uniform and patrolling the field as the lone Chippewa punt returner and swing back.

In his four years of punt return duty, Hollern has displayed enviable cool and sure-handedness at a pressure position. The Grand Rapids Catholic Central all-state senior has also started at swing back for two years, catching 14 passes and carrying the ball

CMU head coach Herb Deromedi and his staff don't think Hollern's questionable size is a factor. "He doesn't have a lot of limitations," said Deromedi. "He doesn't have sprinter's speed but

he has exceptional quickness and a knack for using his abilities."
"People say, 'He's only 5'7,'" said receiver coach Mose Rison.
"Yes, but he can bench press 350 pounds and he runs a 4.6, 40 (yard dash). He has good speed and good hands."

Hollern is known as a hard worker, setting an example in practice as well as working out on his own. He stayed in Mt. Pleasant over the summer and worked out regularly, running sprints and lifting weights.

"I wanted to make sure I was in top condition for my senior year," said Hollern. "Football has been my life. I want to make sure I go out the right way. Coming into camp there was no doubt in my mind that I was in the best shape I've ever been in."

Hollern is known for his daring as a punt returner. By his own count, he had just six fair catches in his first three years. This year he has six already and is less likely to field a punt in a crowd of

"I'm playing a little smarter, not so reckless," said Hollern. "I'm waiting for one you can take all the way back. I'm not going to start pressing and force mental mistakes."

Hollern would love a repeat of a 1983 punt return in Kelly/ Shorts stadium against Northern Illinois that saw him go 74 yards for a touchdown in the 30-14 win. "That was my first TD and it really was exciting for me," said Hollern. "I remember stepping up and catching it and the next thing I knew I was in the open. Some guys were ahead of me angling me to the sidelines and I cut back. Once I saw the end zone I was ready to go. I probably never ran so fast in my life."

Hollern's value to the Chippewas is certainly not limited to his return duties. He earned the starting swing back berth last year and has become a quality receiver.

"He's more than a specialty player, he's a complete player," said Deromedi. "He runs disciplined pass routes and he's an ex-

Hollern has also found the end zone on two touchdown pass receptions this year, a 34-yard strike against Western Michigan and a six-yard pass to beat East Carolina. The play against East Carolina was supposed to go the the tight end, but quarterback Bob DeMarco scrambled when finding him covered.

"When the quarterback is scrambling, I tell him to find an open seam and work his way back to the football," said Rison. "Ted, being an intelligent player, found an open seam and got the quarterback's attention."

"I don't think I knew what happened until four or five seconds later," said Hollern. "Right when I broke into the open Bob hit

Hollern would like to use his football knowledge in the coaching field after graduation. He is a history major in the CMU education curriculum and has a semester of student teaching to complete before graduation.

"I am thankful for a lot of things that have happened here," said Hollern. "I'd like to especially thank my parents for the support they've given me and the coaches for the opportunity to

TED KJOLHEDE: IN THE PROUD CHIPPEWA TRADITION

"Now back in Grant . . ."

If Central Michigan University athletes and coaches had a dollar for every time they heard that expression throughout the past five decades, they'd have had plenty of extra spending money.

For, that was one of the favorite sayings of former CMU athlete, coach and athletic director, Ted Kjolhede. You see, Ted grew up in the tiny community of Grant (25 miles north of Grand Rapids) and he often referred to the way things were done there when he was a boy.

Kjolhede retired on Sept. 1, 1984 after 28 years of service to Central Michigan, first as the successful basketball coach of the Chippewas and later as athletic director.

While the 61-year-old Kjolhede is no longer employed by CMU, he's not gone nor will he be forgotten. He made a lasting impression on Chippewa athletics and helped guide CMU smoothly from a Division II school into a solid Division I

"I have nothing but fond memories of Central Michigan University and its people," said Kjolhede. "It has always been a caring university that took care of its own. Not many schools are like that.

"I've been around here for a long time and I have no plans of leaving, either. I still plan on going to all the football games, home and away, and support the other teams as much as I can."

Kjolhede will be around Mt. Pleasant much of the school year, but don't look for him during the summer. He'll be up on the Betsie River, enjoying his 135 acres of property where he plans to begin construction on a vacation home next summer.

"We've already started clearing out the area for our vacation home," Kjolhede said. "We have a place up there now, but we need a bigger one for our grandchildren and friends."

Ted and his wife, Ginger, have four sons and three grand-children spread throughout the country. Chris is a doctor in Rochester, N.Y.; Bart is a football coach in Wellsville, Kan.; Robert is a coach in Manton, Mich.; and James is a businessman in Colorado Springs, Colo.

"I think we'll do a lot more traveling to visit our sons," Kjolhede said.

In whatever spare time Ted has left, he plans on spending in his garden or on the golf course zeroing in his famed seven-wood.

"I haven't ruled out taking another job in the Mt. Pleasant area and I'd like to write a primer book on basketball for beginning coaches," Kjolhede said. "I'm not looking to make any money on it, I just think there's a need."

Kjolhede has plenty of experience in all phases of athletics to draw on for his book. He was a football, basketball and tennis player for CMU in the mid-1940s, returned in 1956 as its basketball coach and became the AD in 1972.









Born in Spencer, Iowa on April 12, 1923, Kjolhede moved to Grant with his family at the age of two and was raised on a farm. Ted competed in football, basketball and track at Class C Grant High, and came to Central in the fall of 1941 to become a teacher.

His athletic career was interrupted by a lengthy stint in the army as a combat engineer (from spring of 1943 until March of '46). Kjolhede played football in 1942 and '46 while his basketball career included the 1942-43 season as well as '46-47 and '47-48. He played tennis in 1947-48.

Kjolhede started the last two seasons in basketball under Dan Rose, and was captain and MVP his senior season with a 10.5 scoring average. He was a 6-foot, 180-pounder in college.

Kjolhede enjoys talking about the athletic facilities during his playing days, particularly the old Central Hall where the basketball teams toiled. It was located approximately between the present Grawn and Warriner Halls.

"It seated about 700 or 800 people and had a running track around it, and was located on the second floor," Kjolhede recalls with a smile. "It was only 78 feet long, and you had better learn to pass the ball well because there wasn't much room between defenders."

Kjolhede also played football at old Alumni Field, and played in the last night game.

"We used to play night games until one night it was very windy out and the light poles started swaying badly," he said. "The poles were checked out and found to be unsafe. So after that we played during the day. We also played tennis matches on clay courts."

A five-year stay at Grand Haven High as a head football and track coach followed graduation in 1948 while in 1953 he went to Battle Creek Central as head football coach for three seasons. His 1954 Bearcat club was a state champion while in his first year in '54 as basketall coach, Battle Creek fell in the regional finals.

Kjolhede returned to CMU in 1956 as head basketball coach. After seven mediocre seasons, Ted recruited Don "Animal" Edwards to the Mt. Pleasant campus and the Chippewa cage program was on the move. From 1963-64 until 1966-67, CMU won 83 games and lost 22. CMU won the Interstate Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (IIAC) crown in 1965, a coaching highlight for Ted. Two of his teams made it to the NAIA tournament in Kansas City and another fell to Southern Illinois in the second round of the NCAA Division II championships.

After 15 years of coaching and 216 wins against 157 losses, Kjolhede became an assistant athletic director to Rose and took over the top job in January of 1972.

"I enjoyed coaching very much but it was a good opportunity and to become AD at your alma mater is a great thrill," Ted said.

During his reign as AD, CMU built an outdoor track, a baseball stadium, varsity tennis courts and soccer and field hockey fields.

"We went through a great evolution in the athletic program," Kjolhede said. "The emergence of women's athletics and the construction of new facilities were major developments. I didn't foresee any major obstacles ahead when I retired, and I had other things I wanted to do. The timing was right."

The timing has been "right" throughout most of Kjolhede's stay at CMU, and he will always remember his experiences at Central as "pleasurable and rewarding."

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
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
