## SEATING

CMU team bench) are for general admission use on a first-come, CMU team bench are for general admission use on a first-come,
first-served basis. The seating behind the south end zone is for general admission ticket holders and any overflow from the student seating section. There is some reserved seating available in the south
end zone.
All reserved ticket seats, including season tickets, are in the west stands (behind visiting team's bench). The sections are identified by aisles, lettered A-N, with Aisle A at the north end. Each section is divided by an aisle with seats $1-14$ on the left side of the aisle and
$15-28$ on the right side of the aisle.

CENTURY CLUB SEATING
The Century Club, one of the university's strongest financial support groups, offers its members priority seating. As marked below in

## TICKETS

According to almost every pre-season football poll available the real race in the Mid-American Conference (MAC) is for sec ond place. The Bowling Green State University Falcons and crack quarter back Brian McClure are an overwhelming choice everywhere you
look to win the MAC crown and return to the California Bowl However, the fly in the ointment as far as the rest of the con-
ference is concerned is that the favorite has not won the crown in ference is concerned is that the favorite has not won the crown
11 years. And, that's what teams like Central Michigan, Northern Illinois, Miami and Toledo are banking on as the 1985 campaign
gets going.
The Chippewas and veteran coach Herb Deromedi will be the
first to attest to the fact that the favorites don't always win. CMU was the pick of the MAC media in 1984 but finished in third place with a $6-2-1$ mark
"Bowling Green has an outstanding team and should be the team to beat," said Deromedi. "But, there are some other goo
teams in the MAC this year that could make it interesting teams in the MAC this year that could make it interesting."
The Fach Denny Stolz received 61 of 65 first place votes at the annual Football Preview in mid-summer, and finished with 645 points. Central Michigan was second with 531 points
followed by defending champion Toledo at 515 , Miami 431 and followed by defending champion Toledo at 515 , Miami 431 and
Northern Illinois 357 . The rest of the MAC was as follows Western Michigan 321, Kent State 233, Ohio Unvirsity 211 Eastern Michigan 190 and Ball State 141.
Following is a team-by-team thumbnail sketch of the MAC:
BOWIING GREEN - McClure, the $6-7$ senior being billed as a Heisman Trophy candidate, and his stats certainly warrant a look. He entered the season with 7,606 yards in career passing - nearly. 500 more yards than Boston College Dug mark of 10,579 carer yard "He's certainly one of the great players ever to play in the MAC, and at the end of the season he might be considered one of the greats in college football," said Stolz

Junior quarterback Ron Fillmore has recovered from kne surgery and is ready to lead the offense along with Academic All nine TDs). Three starters are back on the offensive line in $6-6$ 280 -pound tackle Brian Williams, $6-3,245$-pound guard Rick Po jan and 6-3, 245-pound center Mike Brunner. A pair of outstanding linebackers in seniors Kevin Egnatuk and
Steve Sklenar anchor the defense along with safty and cornerback Carl Kloosterman. CMU's kicking game, a problem area last season, should be
greatly improved. greatly improved.

TOLEDO - A strong defense that must keep the Rockets in the contest is the key for Coach Dan Simrell's charges as they try to
defend their crown. Eight of 11 starters are back on defense led by 6-4, 271-pound tackle Brent Williams and 6-4, 214-pound end offensive line. Junior A. J. Sager is a proven quantity at QB hav ing passed for 1,510 yards in " 84 .' "Magic is Back" at Miami thi
MIAMI - They're saying the ear after two straight $4-7$ seasons - virtually unheard of a radition-rich Miami. A solid kicking game and an improved
defense are the keys because the Redskins of Coach Tim Rose eturn nine regulars on offense. Tops is tailback George Swarn who gained 1,282 yards in ' 84 . The QB will be Al Marlow, who it on 39 of 66 passes in 1984 for 416 yards as a reserve.
NORTHERN ILIINOIS - Impressive in the ' 85 opener (a 17-0 win over Western Michigan), the Huskies could be the sleeper in the MAC this season under new coach Jerry Pettibone. Th defense is outstanding, especially the line where $6-3,263$-pound
Scott Kellar and $6-2,236$-pound Doug Bartlett hang out. Depth and offensive production is a concern although $6-3,285$-pound tackle Todd Peat is not. Frosh Marshall Taylor of Detroit won the QB job

Seven starters are back on offense and eight on defense. Coach Jack Harbaugh says WMU has its best depth since 1982 although a tough early-season schedule may slow progress. KENT STATE - Another team that may make waves this
season under third-year coach Dick Scesniak. Golden Flashes won one game in 1983 and four in ' 84 . Defensive line and linebacking are areas of strength. Tailback Derrick Nix gained 720 yards tough OHIO UNIVERSITY - Former Bobcat quarterback standout Cleve Bryant hopes to lead Ohio football back to the top as its new head coach. Defense will be a main area of concern as nine starters return on offense. QB Dennis Swearington passed for
1,211 yards last fall, and OU will definitely try the air this season. Defensive tackle Sherman Carter ( $6-1,245$ ) is talented. EASTERN MICHIGAN - Buoyed by a season-opening 27-22 win over Youngstown State, Coach Jim Harkema hopes to lead
the Hurons out of the lower division of the MAC. Talent at skill ed positions may help make up for the lack of "blue collar" players in the trenches. The play of QB Robert Gordon is an offensive key. Tailback Gary Patton is a slashing sophomore who placekicker Mario Ferretti and punter Bob Hirschmann is the best BALL STATE - First-year coach Paul Schudel had a rough MAC debut when Bowling Green posted a $31-6$ victory. Eight
starters are back on offense and defense. QB Neil Britt hit for 1,205 yards last year and tailback Burt Austin rushed for 551 yards. Linebacker Brad Saar is one of the MAC's best.
