last week's $48-10$ win over Montana State, a Central Michigan record. Three backs over 100 yards also is believed to be a MidAmerican Conference record.
Junior tailbacks Donnie Riley (141) and John Hood (112), an sophomore fulback Joe Connolly (102) accounted for 361 of
CMU's 487 rushing yards. The 487 yards rushing is a Kelly/Shorts Stadium record.
Connolly was the first Chippewa fullback to rush for 100 yards since Todd Nowak ran for 109 at Kent State in 1986. Connolly's 102 yards vs. Montana State came on just eight carries.
Today is CMU's 18th meeting with Kent as the Chippewas hold a $10-7$ advantage in the series. The Golden Flashes have won the last two contest in dramatic fashion, however, pulling out las second victories at Kent in 1986 and 198
Fans can expect another ground stampede today, as Kent comes in averaging 261 yards rushing per game, and the Chippewas 295.3. Kent senior tailback Eric Wilkerson has a 116.8 yard average, while sophomore quarterback Patrick Young is at 92

## Welcome to Kelly/Shorts Stadium

Welcome to Kelly/ Shorts Stadium. We hope you enjoy your visit and will return often to Central Michigan University. The following information is offered to assist you in utilizing the stadium's services and facilities

## SEATING

During football games all the seats on the east sideline (behind the CMU team bench) are for general admission use on a first-come, first-served basis. The seating behind the south end zone is for general admission ticket holders and any overflow from the student
seating section. There is some reserved seating available in the south seating se
end zone.
All reserved ticket seats, including season tickets, are in the west stands (behind visiting team's bench). The sections are identified by
aisles, lettered A-N, with Aisle A at the north end aisles, lettered A-N, with Aisle $A$ at the north end. Each section is
divided by an aisle with seats $1-14$ on the left side of the aisle and divided by an aisle with seats $1-14$
$15-28$ on the right side of the aisle.

CHIPPEWA CLUB SEATING
The Chippewa Club, one of the university's strongest financial support groups, offers its members priority seating. As marked below in the shaded sections, Aisle C, D, E, and rows 1-36 are re-
served for Chippewa Club persons who purchase season tickets. For additional information, call (517) 774-3045, Monday through Friday. TICKETS
Tickets are sold Monday through Friday in the ticket office at the Dan Rose Center, adjacent to the stadium. On game days, the stadium ticket booths open at 10 a.m. General admission tickets are
always sold on game days plus any unsold reserved seats. Tickets for future home games will be on sale at the stadium booths immediately after the home games. The top prices are $\$ 8$ for reserved and $\$ 5$ for general admission. Some road game tickets can be purchased during
the week at the Rose Center ticket office. For additional ticket information, call (517) 774-3045, Monday through Friday.

## EMERGENCY AID

Authorized personnel are on duty to render emergency medical treatment in the first aid room which is located behind the south concession stand under the press box. Doctors may use the telephone in
the first aid room to respond to emergency calls. Central Michigan Community Hospital has an ambulance crew on standby duty at all home games.

Kelly/Shorts Stadium, the home of Central Michigan University
football, opened in 1972. football, opened in 1972.
The stadium was originally named Shorts Stadium in honor of R. Perry Shorts, a 1900 graduate of Central Michigan, who went on to a In June of 1983, the CMU Board of Trustees voted to rename the stadium Kelly/Shorts Stadium in honor of Kenneth (Bill) Kelly Kelly coached the Chippewa football team from 1951 to 1966. Com
