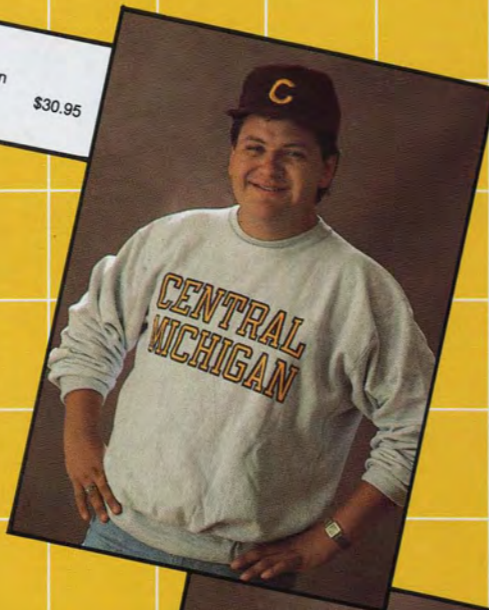

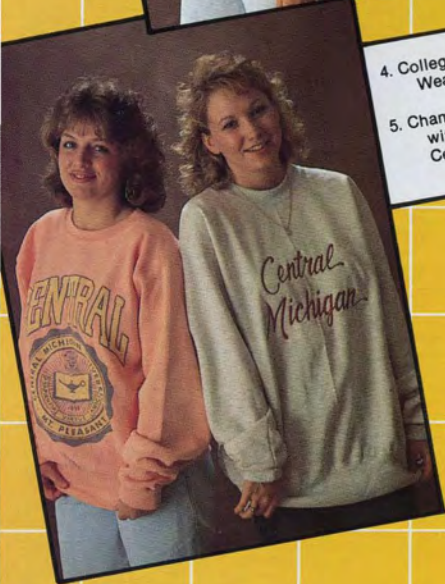

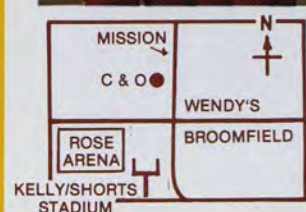

AROUND THE MAC

After knocking heads with non-conference foes for much of the season, a full slate of important Mid-American Conference tilts is on tap for today, highlighted by the CMU-Kent clash right here.

The Chippewas are anxious to open their league schedule after two straight victories, and will be put to the test immediately against preseason favorite Kent. The Golden Flashes have dropped two in a row, 38-14 at Kentucky last Saturday, and 21-14 in a big showdown at 1987 MAC champ Eastern Michigan two weeks ago. Kent stands at 2-2 overall and 0-1 in the MAC.

While EMU (2-0, 3-1) has the week off, surprising co-leader Ball State hosts Miami. Ball State (2-0, 3-0) was picked seventh in the MAC preseason poll, but has ignored the "experts" and opened with wins over Toledo, Bowling Green and Massachusetts.

The Cardinals, idle last week, have the league's top-ranked passer in David Riley (549 yards, three TDs), and Mark Stevens and Bernie Parmalee are two of the league's top 10 rushers.

The struggling continued for Miami (0-1, 0-4) last week with a 34-18 loss to Cincinnati in the 100th meeting of the two rivals. Four fumbles led to the Redskins' downfall and negated a 236-yard passing display by quarterback Chris Ondrula.

Down in Kalamazoo, the Broncos of Western Michigan return to action, hosting Bowling Green in a battle of teams going in different directions. WMU (1-0, 3-0) opened the season with an upset win over Wisconsin of the Big Ten and hasn't slowed down. The Broncos boast MAC total offense leader Tony Kimbrough and four of the top 10 receivers. Tailback Rob Davis gives them a balanced attack, averaging 133 yards on the ground.

The Falcons (0-2, 0-4), meanwhile dropped their fourth straight last Saturday, 34-5, at Toledo. BG Quarterback Rich Dackin threw for 263 yards in the game, moving him past the 4,000-yard milestone in his career.

Toldedo (2-1, 1-3) needed that win to avert a 0-3 league start that would have buried the Rockets. Tailback Alan Smiley paced the attack with 141 yards and three TDs, while Bruce Nichols now has 42 career field goals, a UT record.

The Rockets are at Ohio (0-0, 0-3) this afternoon to battle the Bobcats. OU is in the midst of a 12-game losing streak after last week's 26-18 loss at Nevada-Las Vegas.



CHIP SHOTS

Three Chippewa running backs eclipsed the 100-yard mark in last week's 48-10 win over Montana State, a Central Michigan record. Three backs over 100 yards also is believed to be a Mid-American Conference record.

Junior tailbacks Donnie Riley (141) and John Hood (112), and sophomore fullback Joe Connolly (102) accounted for 361 of CMU's 487 rushing yards. The 487 yards rushing is a Kelly/Shorts Stadium record.

Connolly was the first Chippewa fullback to rush for 100 yards since Todd Nowak ran for 109 at Kent State in 1986. Connolly's 102 yards vs. Montana State came on just eight carries.

Today is CMU's 18th meeting with Kent as the Chippewas hold a 10-7 advantage in the series. The Golden Flashes have won the last two contest in dramatic fashion, however, pulling out last-second victories at Kent in 1986 and 1987.

Fans can expect another ground stampede today, as Kent comes in averaging 261 yards rushing per game, and the Chippewas 295.3. Kent senior tailback Eric Wilkerson has a 116.8 yard average, while sophomore quarterback Patrick Young is at 92.0. Central is led by Riley's 139.7 and Hood's 112 yard average.

Central fans can welcome Dan Majerle back from the Olympics when the Phoenix Suns and Denver Nuggets play an exhibition game at Rose Arena on Saturday, Oct. 15, at 7:30 p.m.

Remaining tickets for the event are \$13 and \$10 and are on sale at the Rose Center ticket office (774-3041).

The contest will wrap up what promises to be an action-packed Homecoming weekend.

BRIAN SMALLBONE
6-6, 275 Pounds, Offensive Tackle

Don't let the name Smallbone fool you. Brian Smallbone is anything but small.

Central Michigan's mammoth senior offensive tackle stands 6-6 and tips the scales at 275 pounds. Smallbone is hard to miss on the field, but if you don't notice him for his size, he hopes to make you notice with his blocking.

"If you make a good block, you know it. If you can make the people in the crowd notice, that's great," Smallbone said.

Smallbone will have to make people notice this season. His personal goal is to make all-conference, but he was overlooked on the preseason all-conference teams.

"I'd like to make all-conference this season, but my chances are slim since I wasn't on any preseason all-conference teams. You never know, though. I just have to go out and hit," Smallbone said.

Smallbone was an outstanding athlete in high school, earning all-state honors in both football and basketball. He was

recruited by Michigan State and Arizona State as well as CMU. Smallbone chose the Chippewas in part because his older brothers, Marty and Steve, played for Central in the late '70's and early '80's.

"I used to come up and watch Marty and Steve play, so I was familiar with CMU. I've always been a Central football fan," Smallbone said.

Smallbone made a smooth transition from CMU football fan to CMU football player. He has made vast improvements during his career.

A part-time starter as a sophomore, he has been a fixture at right tackle the past two seasons, opening holes for CMU's explosive running attack. Smallbone says former CMU line coach Mike Poff and current line coach Paul Alexander have made a big impact on his career.

"When coach Alexander came in the winter before last season I really started to improve. Coach Poff influenced me a lot while he was here, too," Smallbone said.

Playing his college football at CMU has been special to Smallbone, but one more goal remains for him -- a trip to California.

"I'd like to win the MAC and go to the California Bowl. That's my goal for the team. Winning the MAC is what it is all about," Smallbone said.

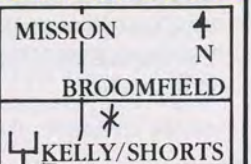

The exhilarating and truly distinctive pre-game and halftime performances of CMU's Chippewa Marching Band result from the direction of two members of the Department of Music. They are Jack Saunders, director of the marching band and associate director of bands, and John E. Williamson, director of bands. Saunders, a 23 year faculty member, plots the intricate, precision movements of the 210 member marching band. He is assisted in this area with the unique visual designs of Alan Demski, Flint graduate student. In his 10th year at CMU, Williamson is in charge of producing the exciting sound that has gained the Chippewa Marching Band such an enviable reputation throughout the country.

Many of the band's original musical arrangements are created by CMU alumnus Paul Lavender, a professional arranger. The driving percussion section is led on the field by Doug Corella, Milford junior. The band's 210 members include a 27-member color guard (24 appear in performances) coordinated and choreographed by Emily Crocker, Ithaca senior, and Teresa Fine, Mt. Pleasant sophomore.

Welcome to Kelly/Shorts Stadium

Welcome to Kelly/Shorts Stadium. We hope you enjoy your visit and will return often to Central Michigan University. The following information is offered to assist you in utilizing the stadium's services and facilities.

SEATING

During football games all the seats on the east sideline (behind the CMU team bench) are for general admission use on a first-come, first-served basis. The seating behind the south end zone is for general admission ticket holders and any overflow from the student seating section. There is some reserved seating available in the south end zone.

All reserved ticket seats, including season tickets, are in the west stands (behind visiting team's bench). The sections are identified by aisles, lettered A-N, with Aisle A at the north end. Each section is divided by an aisle with seats 1-14 on the left side of the aisle and 15-28 on the right side of the aisle.

CHIPPEWA CLUB SEATING

The Chippewa Club, one of the university's strongest financial support groups, offers its members priority seating. As marked below in the shaded sections, Aisle C, D, E, and rows 1-36 are reserved for Chippewa Club persons who purchase season tickets. For additional information, call (517) 774-3045, Monday through Friday.

TICKETS

Tickets are sold Monday through Friday in the ticket office at the Dan Rose Center, adjacent to the stadium. On game days, the stadium ticket booths open at 10 a.m. General admission tickets are always sold on game days plus any unsold reserved seats. Tickets for future home games will be on sale at the stadium booths immediately after the home games. The top prices are \$8 for reserved and \$5 for general admission. Some road game tickets can be purchased during the week at the Rose Center ticket office. For additional ticket information, call (517) 774-3045, Monday through Friday.

EMERGENCY AID

Authorized personnel are on duty to render emergency medical treatment in the first aid room which is located behind the south concession stand under the press box. Doctors may use the telephone in the first aid room to respond to emergency calls. Central Michigan Community Hospital has an ambulance crew on standby duty at all home games.

LOST AND FOUND

Lost and found items should be turned in or reported at the south concession stand during the game. After the game, CMU's public safety office, corner of East Campus Drive and Preston Street, will accept these items and reports. Individuals who are separated from their companions should plan on reuniting just inside the stadium's north entrances either during the halftime or immediately after the game.

EMERGENCY ANNOUNCEMENTS

Emergency public address announcements only should be brought to the south entrance of the press box.

RESTROOMS

Public restrooms are available in the service buildings behind the stands on both sides of the field. The entrances to the rest rooms are on the sides away from the playing field.

PUBLIC TELEPHONES

Pay telephones are available behind the service buildings on each side of the field.

CONCESSION STANDS

Food, drink and souvenirs may be purchased at the concession stands at each end of the service buildings on both sides of the field. Administered by the University's Food Services, the stands are augmented by soft drink booths at the southeast and southwest corners of the stadium.

KELLY/SHORTS STADIUM HISTORY

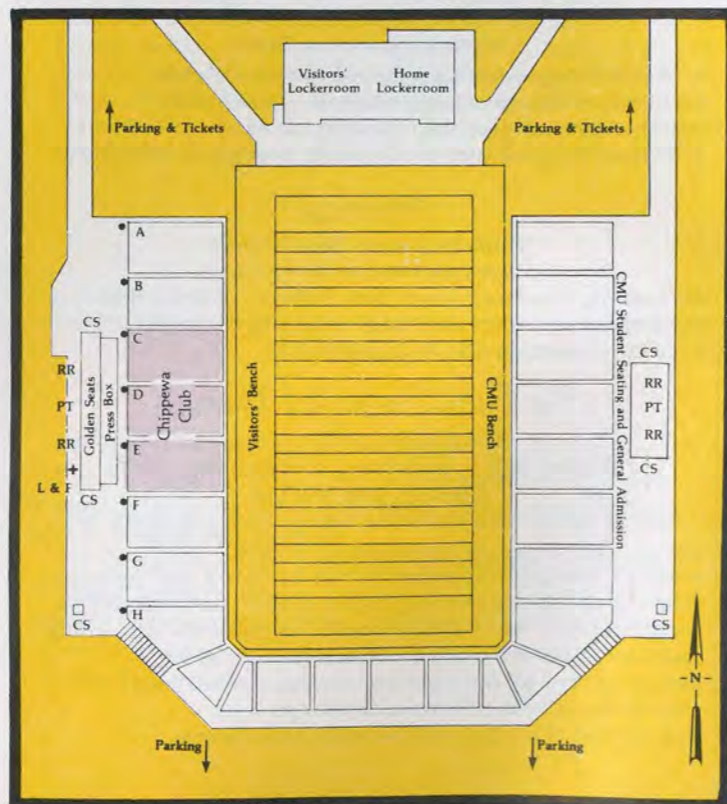
Kelly/Shorts Stadium, the home of Central Michigan University football, opened in 1972.

The stadium was originally named Shorts Stadium in honor of R. Perry Shorts, a 1900 graduate of Central Michigan, who went on to a distinguished banking career in Saginaw.

In June of 1983, the CMU Board of Trustees voted to rename the stadium Kelly/Shorts Stadium in honor of Kenneth (Bill) Kelly. Kelly coached the Chippewa football team from 1951 to 1966. Compiling a record of 91-58-2, he is the winningest football coach in CMU history.

The stadium received a facelift of sorts prior to the 1983 season as a new wall-to-wall Astro Turf playing surface was installed to replace the surface that had covered the stadium floor since the 1972 opening. Half of the cost of the \$525,000 Astro Turf carpet came from private donations.

And all the pageantry and excitement of CMU football was greatly enhanced in 1986 with the addition of a new scoreboard that ranks with the best in college athletics. The scoreboard, which measures 36 ft. high and 50 ft. wide graces the south side of the stadium. Its most exciting feature is the computer-controlled message board which features rolling messages, characters and advertisements from contracted sponsors — the only one of its kind in a mid-west collegiate football stadium.

RODNEY LACKEY NAMED '88 BOYDEN AWARD WINNER

Bill was a football and track star who earned recognition as most valuable backfield man in his senior year at Central and set a Central Michigan record for the 100-yard dash in track which stood for many years. Active on campus, Bill was elected President of Central's Student Council and acted in several campus dramatic productions.

Following graduation, and before embarking on a successful business career, Bill spent a rewarding year teaching and coaching baseball and basketball at Peck High School in the Thumb Area of Michigan. In addition to his work in the private business arena, he demonstrated a lifelong commitment to his community. He

Upon graduation the willing applicant is provided a cash grant of at least \$1,500 For continuation of education or furtherance of other career goals. Alternatively, because of NCAA regulations, if the recipient is on athletic scholarship, he or she may direct the \$1,500 cash award to any department or project within the university. The award winner's name is inscribed on the permanent plaque located prominently in Rose Arena. The honoree also is presented with an individual plaque and special gold "C" Boyden Award lapel pin.

Nominations for the Boyden Award may be made directly by the nominee or by a coach, teacher or fellow student. Applications for the award are available at the athletic office and must be submitted between January 1 and April of each year.

The Boyden Award winner is selected each spring from among those applicants who are varsity letter winners and will be seniors the following fall. The award is not primarily an academic one. Instead, it singles out that senior to be of satisfactory academic standing whose record best combines participation in a varsity intercollegiate sport with leadership ability in campus affairs and activities, interest or accomplishments in the arts, and community involvement. The Boyden award is designed to honor that athlete who is and will be an exemplary representative of Central Michigan University.

Although running hurt, Lackey still placed third at the 1988 MAC Championships in the 100-meters here at CMU last spring.

"Rodney is one of the most likeable people I've ever been around," Knapp said. "His teammates look up to him because of his tremendous work habits. I'm not interested in a rah-rah type of person for a captain, but one who works hard and gets the job done. Rodney is one of those people."

As a prep at Royal Oak Shrine, Lackey gained all-state plaudits in the 100 and 200-meter dashes, and earned several all-regional and all-Catholic honors.

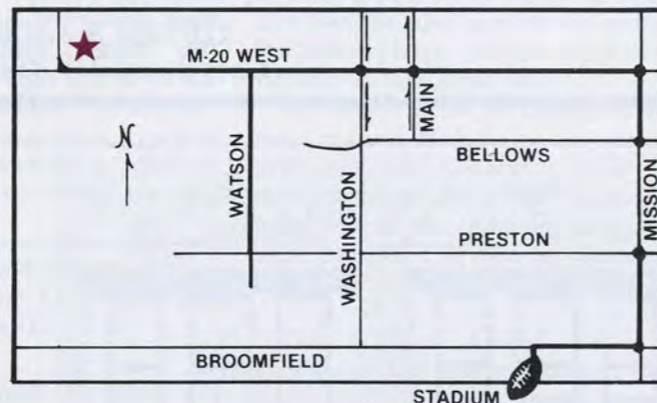

"Good Afternoon and Welcome to Sunny Kelly/Shorts Stadium"

It is shortly after 10 a.m., still nearly three hours before CMU's home football opener vs. Montana State, when that distinctive voice travels the long corridor of the Kelly/Shorts Stadium press box.

"I think they add more steps to this thing every year," he says, referring to the staircase he had just scaled to reach his perch.

But, this is not a complaint. Dick Allen is smiling as he approaches and immediately begins to rehash last night's Olympic basketball game in which former Chippewa Dan Majerle netted a team-high 20 points.

Allen knows of nothing else to do nor anywhere else to be on these football Saturdays. The 56-year old speech and dramatic arts faculty member is in his 10th year as the public address announcer high atop Kelly/Shorts. He has been the voice of the Chippewa Marching Band for 20 years, and also handles the baseball and men's basketball public address duties.

Allen's PA days started with the baseball team a number of year ago when Dave Keilitz, current CMU athletic director, asked for his services.

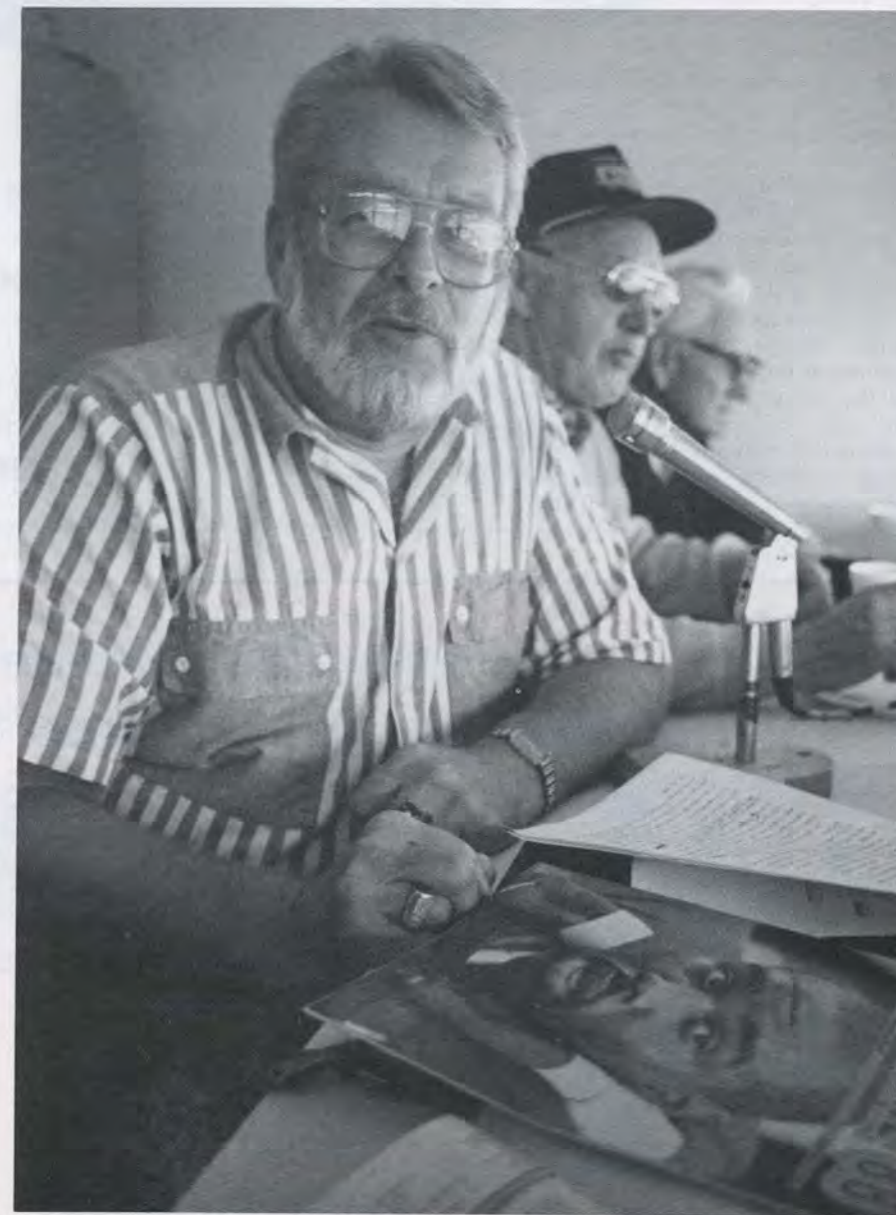
Since then, it has never rained at a CMU baseball or football game -- at least according to Allen's trademark welcome to "sunny Kelly/Shorts" or "sunny Theunissen Stadium."

"I feel like I'm part of the program; closer to it than the average fan," Allen said. "That's one of the most satisfying aspects. All it means is getting somewhere and hour or two earlier than where I'm going to be anyway, so I never think of the time involved."

In truth, Allen is too busy enjoying his "work" to think about the hours he puts in. He is a genuine Chippewa fan, even peculiarly so, since he earned his bachelor's ('53), master's ('64) and doctorate's ('70) degrees at Michigan State University.

"You know, I have not been back to MSU for an athletic event since I came here (in 1967)," Allen said. "I guess by now I have as much Maroon and Gold blood running through me as anybody. In fact, I never got a class ring from Michigan State, but..."

Allen proudly displays a Central Michigan class ring on his right hand, a gift from his wife of 35 years, Jean.

It is that sincere bond and loyalty to the University that makes Allen an integral figure in the scheme of Chippewa athletics. "Dick Allen adds tremendous color to the game. He's got a great voice and precise timing, knowing what to say and when to say it," Keilitz said. "Every school

wishes they had a person like Dick because of his willingness to help better the University. He's undoubtedly a most loyal fan of CMU athletics and the band." Like most fans, Allen has several vivid and lasting memories from his two decades as a Chippewa follower. Talk about foot-

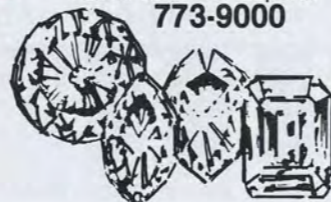

ball and, without hesitation, Allen goes into detailed description of the 1979 Homecoming game with Bowling Green.

"ABC was televising the game and Ron Rummel brought Central back with three touchdowns in the last quarter. I remember Mike Ball catching the winning TD pass and Rummel laying on his back after being hit as time was running out," he said, smiling and shaking his head. "It doesn't get any more exciting than that."

Allen also is fond of the 1974 Division II National Championship team for its uncanny ability to improve from week to week, culminating in a 54-14 demolition of Delaware in the title game.

"We were heavy underdogs going into that game, but I believe everyone who followed us that year knew we would win," Allen said. "You could see the improvement before your eyes from week to week. We knew the championship game would be our best game, and if we had to play one after that, we would've been better in that one."

"Dick Dunham went 68 yards on the first play from scrimmage and it was the beginning of the end for Delaware. I still have the newspaper clippings from that game."

Among other lasting images in Allen's mental scrapbook are the toilet paper white-outs at Rose Arena, Dan Round-

field's shot blocking ability in the mid-70's, the work ethic of Dan Majerle and the five consecutive Mid-American Conference baseball championships.

"Watching Roundfield block shots was a good as a slam dunk; he could turn games around," Allen said. "As for baseball, that team gets more amazing each year because of the difficulty involved in repeating as champion. It seems that MAC baseball is even more balanced than football or basketball, so the feat is that much more impressive."

Those moments etched in his mind are payment enough for each step taken up to the press box. So are the athletes themselves, whose names have flowed from Allen's vocal cords throughout the years.

"I hope I never outgrow the thrill of seeing a Majerle, a Hogeboom, a Roundfield going on the make a name for themselves," Allen said. "It's something special not just to be able to call them by name, but to have them call me by name when they see me. It makes me proud."

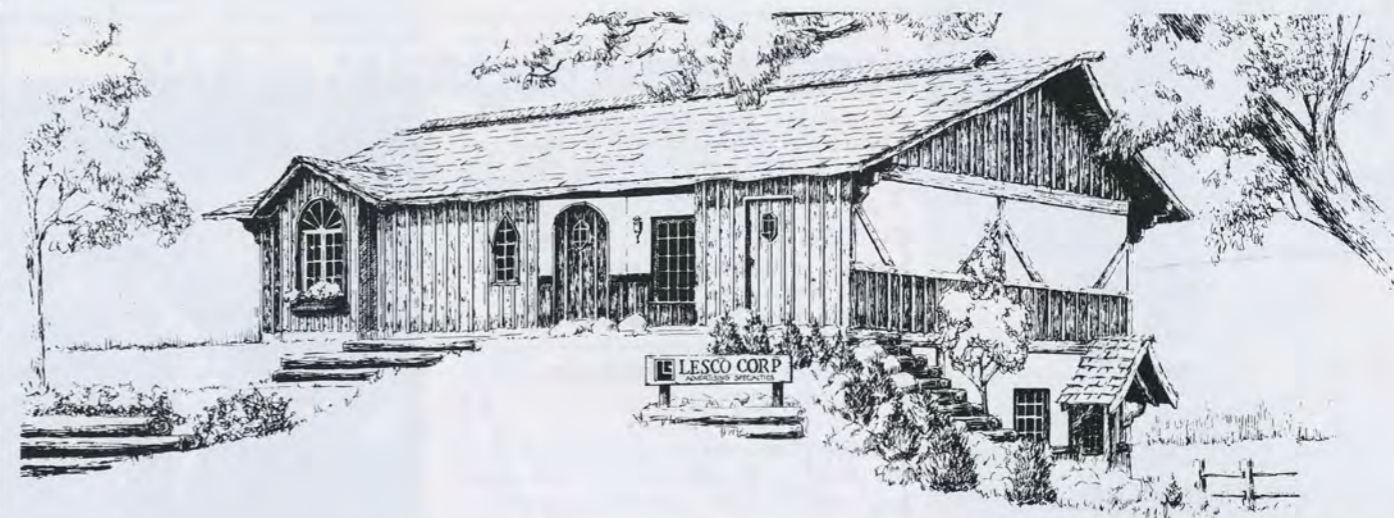

DAN MAJERLE

Former Chippewa Dan Majerle found himself in a familiar position with the USA team—at the top of the scoring list, averaging 14.3 points a game.

As the 1988 Summer Olympic Games come to a close this weekend in Seoul, there is little doubt the event will be remembered by Chippewa followers for quite some time.

Three CMU alumni were in Seoul during the past two weeks, each representing the United States in a different capacity. Dan Majerle, '88, was exceeding all expectations as a do-it-all man on the United States basketball team; Tom Minkel, '71, has been serving the U.S. Greco-Roman wrestling team as the assistant coach, and Dick Enberg, '57, has been calling the action at the gymnastics venue as a sportscaster for NBC.

In the Mid-American Conference, Majerle was accustomed to seeing his name atop others like Grant Long and Derrick Wesley in league scoring lists. Well, some things don't seem to change, no matter who he plays with.

Entering the final game earlier this week, the 6-5 swingman was leading the U.S. team with 101 points, a 14.3 average. No small feat when the names Robinson, Manning and Hawkins are on the same list.

Majerle has scored inside and outside, on dunks and three-pointers. He has assisted, rebounded and even has played point guard during the tournament.

CMU coach Charles Coles and the rest of the CMU faithful always knew Majerle was a special player—now the rest of the country knows.

Minkel, a former Olympian himself on the 1980 team victimized by the U.S. boycott, is roundly considered one of the top Greco-Roman coaches in the country. He coached the 1986 World Cup team and assisted on the world and Pan American teams in 1987.

Minkel was a four-time national Greco-Roman champion and made seven U.S. teams on international tours. At CMU, Minkel was a Division I All-American, the first Chippewa ever to receive that distinction.

Minkel can now lay claim to having coached an Olympic medalist, as 220-pounder Dennis Koslowski won the bronze in that weight class.

In addition to his work at the gymnastic site, Enberg co-hosted the Opening Ceremonies with anchor Bryant Gumbel. The two received "best teamwork" plaudits from USA Today for their observations and comments during that first telecast.

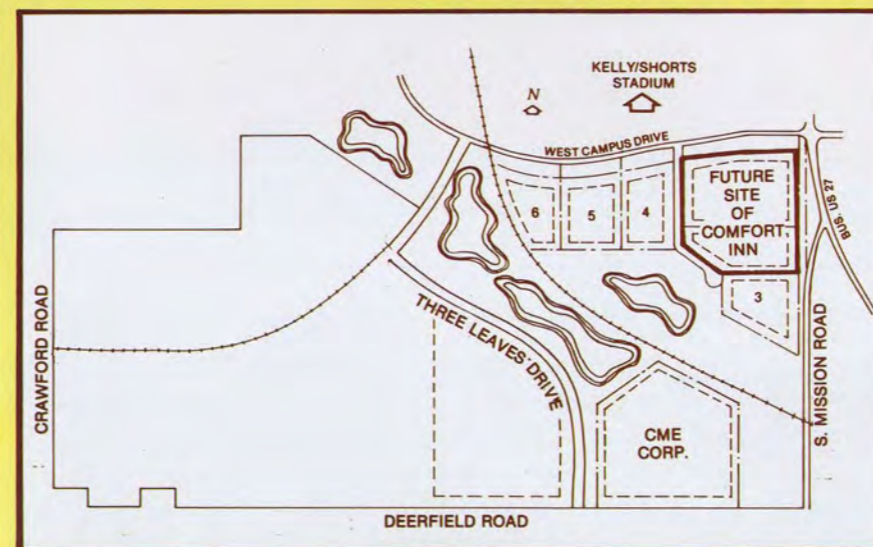

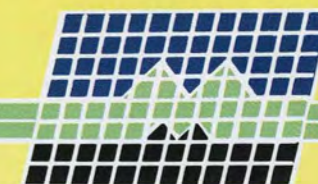
