
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
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


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CHIPPEW GAME DAY

AROUND THE MAC

Seldom are games labeled "pivotal" in the second week of the season, but don't tell that to the folks in Ypsilanti tonight, where Western Michigan invades Rynearson Stadium to battle the Eastern Michigan Hurons.

This intrastate grudge match marks the opening of the 1990 season for the Broncos, and is the first Mid-American Conference battle for both schools. Eastern Michigan was picked second in the league's preseason poll, and WMU was tabbed for fourth.

The Hurons must rebound from a 41-10 loss at Fresno State last Saturday, a game in which they led 10-7 until just before halftime. The tailback combination of Mitch Brown (95 yards) and Eddie Nwagbaraocha (60) led the way for EMU.

The Broncos will look to sophomore quarterback Bard Tayles, the 1989 MAC Freshman-of-the-Year, for leadership. Tayles threw for 1,909 yards and eight touchdowns last season, but was intercepted 25 times.

One other game on today's slate pits two conference schools, as Toledo travels to Miami looking to prove the preseason experts right. The Rockets, winners of four of their last five games in '89, led the MAC in total offense last season. Returning to that unit are sophomore signal caller Kevin Meger and a trio of talented receivers in wide outs Rick Isiah and Romauldo Brown. and tight end Jerry Evans.

The Redskins, under first-year coach Randy Walker are coming off a disappointing 34-0 loss at North

Carolina last week, as six turnovers helped the Tar Heels' cause.

Another head coaching debut was soured last Saturday, as Ohio dropped a 35-3 contest to No. 18 Pittsburgh under Tom Lichtenberg. Pitt outgained the Bobcats 228-35 in the first quarter as OU lost its season opener for the 12th straight year.

Non-conference games fill the rest of today's schedule with defending champion Ball State opening at Illinois State, Akron visiting Kent, and Bowling Green traveling to Virginia Tech.

Kent played well in its opener last week, losing to No. 25 West Virginia, 35-24. Kent quarterback Joe Dalpra passed for two TDs and ran for another as the Golden Flashes were within four of WVU late in the contest.

Bowling Green was the only conference school to win on Labor Day weekend, downing Cincinnati, 34-20, last Sunday. The Falcons were led by tailback LeRoy Smith, who ran for 112 yards and caught a pair of passes for 35 yards on the day. BGSU totaled 406 yards in offense while limiting the Bearcats to 294 yards.

CHIPPEWAS HONORED-Inside linebacker Rich Curtiss was selected the MAC Defensive Player-of-the-Week for his efforts at Kentucky last week. The 6-2, 225-pound senior from DeWitt registered 11 tackles, 10 of them solos, and broke up a pass to lead CMU's defense.

Earning Chippewa Player-of-the-Week honors were Jeff Bender on offense, David Johnson on defense and Todd Reynolds on special teams. Bender threw for 201 yards and a TD, while Johnson had six solo tackles and two assists at safety. Reynolds had five tackles on defense, and carried the ball 10 yards on a fake punt for a CMU first down in the fourth quarter. OFFENSIVE BALANCE—That's what the

Chippewas had Saturday at Kentucky, using 42 yards running plays and 39 passes to rack up 343 yards against the Wildcats. Central ran for 142 yards—led by tailback Darnell Rush's 87—and passed for 201, scoring one TD on the ground and one through the air.


Wide outs Bob Kench and Ken Ealy each caught five passes, with Ealy totaling 98 yards including a 42-yard scoring catch. ANOTHER NICHOLL'S WORTH-CMU fans haven't seen the last of a Nicholl kicking at Central, despite graduation of record-setting Kevin Nicholl. Dennis Nicholl, Kevin's brother, enjoyed an impressive debut at Kentucky, hitting his only field goal attempt and punting seven times for a 41-yard average.



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ERIC STOCKFORD - NO. 83 6-2, 230 Pounds, Tight End

After hard work and a wait of three years, senior tight end Eric Stockford has made it to the top.

"I have worked hard year after year and I am finally where I always wanted to be," Stockford said. "Now I must concentrate on making myself the best football player that I can be."

The 6-2, 230-pounder has been second team behind 1989 all-Mid-American Conference (MAC) second team tight end Mark Hopkins.

"This year is much different," he said. "Every year I had been fighting for the second spot and it was tough to show my potential. With the chance I have now to start, I'll be able to show what I can do. This season my goal is to make an all-MAC team."

Stockford came to Central as a preferred walk-on and in 1988 he caught three passes for 47 yards and in 1989 three passes for 34 yards. Stockford remembers the 3-yard touchdown catch at Eastern Michigan University in 1988 as his CMU career highlight.


"My goal for this season, as I am sure it is every other player's, is to win the conference," Stockford said. "If we come together as a unit and take each game one at a time, there is a great chance. We have the potential. We'll see what happens in the end. We have to start now with our non-conference games."

He was recruited by many Division II schools around the state, but turned them down having determined during a psychology class his sophomore year that Division I athletics was his goal.

"When my senior year arrived and I had been recruited only by Division II schools, I remembered my list of goals when I was 16, Stockford said. "I knew football was my best sport so I chose to come to CMU as a preferred walk-on."

Eric will graduate in May with a major in human resource management and a minor in psychology. He would like to work in a personnel department of a major company.

SCOTT LAMPHERE - NO. 98 6-2, 225 Pounds, Linebacker

When Jack Lambert was leading the Pittsburgh Steelers to four Super Bowls in the late '70s, Scott Lamphere was a kid like any other ... with a hero and a dream.

"Jack Lambert was my idol, and I loved the Pittsburgh Steelers," says the senior inside linebacker, recalling his Sunday afternoons in North Branch. "My cousin Dan and I would watch game after game, then go outside and re-enact the big plays afterward. That's when I began to feel a love for the game.

Ironically, Lamphere has played the same position in the same conference for the past three seasons that Lambert, a Kent State alumnus, once did. A Blue Chip recruit and honorable mention prep All-American at North Branch, Lamphere shunned several offers and came to Central, where he believed he could play early in his career.

"It was quite a thrill and honor for me to start two games as a freshman," he said. "The first was against Eastern Michigan, and I really didn't know how much of a rivalry it was until the week of the game. Come game day it hit me; I was scared and excited at the same time.

Lamphere made eight tackles in the 16-6 Chippewa win, and has been a reliable performer ever since. The 6-2, 225-pounder played in every game as a sophomore, and recorded 42 tackles in nine games a year ago.


"I know we'll be rotating four linebacker at the inside spots this season, and I'm comfortable playing both the strong and weak sides. I want to play to the best of my abilities each game and reach my standards," Lamphere said.

Lamphere also will take time this season to appreciate what the last four years have brought.

"I've got a new family now. The 20 guys I came in with, and the whole football team have been like a second family, and it's a great feeling that I'll miss having," he added.


And, a third family is on the horizon. After graduating in May with a marketing degree, Lamphere and fiancee Carrie Carter will be married next August 10.

HEAD COACH HERB DEROMEDI



With the 1990 season, Central Michigan University head coach Herb Deromedi has been on the Chippewa sidelines for parts of four decades, quietly asserting himself as one of the top coaches in Mid-American Conference and CMU history.

Deromedi joined the Chippewa staff as an assistant coach in 1967 and has been here ever since, taking the head coaching reins in 1978. The dean of MAC football coaches. Deromedi enters his 13th season with the top winning percentage among active league coaches, and fifth on the alltime list. He is just six wins away from becoming CMU's winningest football coach, and also is No. 2 on the CMU list for games coached.

Deromedi has led his 12 CMU teams to an overall record of 86-39-5 (.681). That record, along with the 71-28-5 (.707) league mark, is the best in the league during the time frame. The 71 conference wins rank first on the all-time MAC ledger, and 86 overall triumphs rate second in league coaching annals

In addition, Deromedi ranks eighth among all active NCAA Division I coaches in winning percentage and follows only Miami's Ara Parseghian and Bo Schembechler, Bowling Green's Doyt Perry and Ball State's Dave McClain on the all-time MAC winning percentage list.

The Royal Oak, Mich., native would like nothing better than to begin the '90s in the same fashion he ushered in the last decade-with a MAC championship. Deromedi's charges won conference titles in 1979 and 1980, his second and third years at the helm.

The 51-year-old Deromedi became CMU's 16th head coach on August 7, 1978 when he replaced Roy Kramer, who went to Vanderbilt as athletic director. He had worked as an assistant coach under Kramer since 1967, and had served as the defensive coordinator since 1969. A potent offense and rugged defense have become trademarks of Deromedicoached teams, as CMU has led the MAC in total offense five times and in scoring defense six times during his tenure.

After posting a 9-2 record in his first season, Deromedi's next two teams won MAC titles while going 10-0-1 and 9-2, respectively. CMU won 14 straight games from 1978 to 1979 before battling Toledo to a 7-7 tie, and built up a 23-game unbeaten string until Ohio University ended it in 1980.

Deromedi was second in the balloting for MAC "Coach of the Year" in 1978 and 1979 and garnered the honor at the conclusion of the 1980 campaign.

A 1956 graduate of Royal Oak High School and 1960 graduate of the University of Michigan, Deromedi received his master's degree from Michigan in 1961. He then launched a highly successful six-year stint on the high school level with an overall record of 36-13-2 at Byron (1961-62), Ann Arbor University (1962-64) and Royal Oak Kimball (1964-67) high schools.

Since Deromedi came to Mt. Pleasant in 1967, the Chippewas have tallied a 160-68-7 mark (.696) and never have had a losing season.

Deromedi was credited with installing an angle defense in 1972 as the Chippewas began playing a more difficult schedule and attracting more quality football players. The defensive philosophy, which relies on agile, aggressive linebackers, played a key role in CMU's march to the 1974 NCAA Division II national championship against three highlyranked offenses. Central's defenses have ranked among the nation's best seven times since 1974.

The Chippewas offense has proven to be just as strong since Deromedi assumed the lead. In 1986, CMU's explosive option offense attack ranked fourth in the nation in rushing yardage (279.8). Former quarterback Gary Hogeboom rewrote the record book for passing in 1978 and 1979 while being named the MAC's offensive "Player of the Year". Sophomore tailback Curtis Adams received the same honor in 1982 while linebacker Ray Bentley won the top defensive award that year en route to being selected the MAC's "Player of the Year" and Jefferson Award recipient.

Deromedi has coached a total of 55 first team all-MAC performers and 36 second team choices in his 12 years at the helm. In addition, Deromedi's gridders have gained 38 first team academic all-league honors.

On the national level, three players off Deromedi's 1984 club earned All-America honors: Curtis Adams (2nd team, UPI), Jim Bowman (3rd team, AP) and John DeBoer (3rd team, Football News). In addition, Mike Ball (1st, 1980), Kevin Egnatuk (2nd, 1983), John DeBoer (1st, 1984), Steve Sklenar (2nd, 1985) and Bob Stebbins (2nd, 1987) have secured spots on academic All-America teams.

Deromedi currently is on the District V American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) nominating committee and has been an active member of the association

Deromedi, born May 26, 1939, and his wife Marilyn, have three children: David (27), Tom (24) and Lori (20)

Alumni House Grand Opening — Homecoming Day October 20, 1990 **ALUMNI HOUSE TO SERVE UNIVERSITY'S 99,000 GRADUATES**

A building that once was home to four Central Michigan University presidents is now a center for 99,000 alumni.

The transformation of the former president's residence on Bellows Street to an Alumni House was completed in August, According to CMU Alumni Director Carol Hyble, the Alumni House will serve as a welcoming center and "home base" for visiting graduates as well as an office building for the alumni and development staffs.

"The dream to have an Alumni House on campus has been shared by many people throughout the years, including university presidents, trustees, administrators, alumni and development staff members, and Alumni Association board members," says Hyble. "It is certainly a dream come true."

The university's upcoming centennial provided added incentive. The opening of an alumni center in time for the 1992 centennial became one of the first goals established by CMU's centennial planning committee. Administrative approval was granted, and the remodeling project began last spring.

The house was originally built as a private residence in 1941. As campus expanded, the house was purchased by the university to house Central's top executive. Presidents Charles Anspach, Judson Foust, William Boyd and Harold Abel lived there during their tenures.

"It's an attractive building, and its historical significance lends an element of tradition," says Hyble.

The renovation and expansion of the original house included the addition of a conference room, reception areas, staff offices and work rooms. Twenty-one staff members will work in the Alumni House, uniting the alumni and development staffs for the first time since 1985, when the development staff moved into rented offices in downtown Mount Pleasant.

"The Alumni House will serve as a focal point for the centennial celebration," said Hyble. "We plan to highlight the history, traditions and accomplishments of the university. We will host alumni receptions and encourage other campus departments to use it for their alumni events."

The house also will be a center for fund-raising activities and a place where personalized discussions can take place with potential donors to the university. A room housing a telephone bank will support fund-raising campaigns.

Additionally, the Alumni House will serve as a meeting place for the Alumni Association Board of Directors and the Development Fund Board of Directors. The 24-member Alumni Board develops and encourages a spirit of loyalty, concern and cohesiveness among alumni, students, community members and other friends of CMU. The Development Board, with 30 members from across the nation, attempts to raise private gift dollars for the university.

"We plan to create a facility which showcases CMU and the accomplishments of its students, faculty, staff and alumni," said Hyble. "I expect alumni to take advantage of the facility, which lends a visible presence to the lifelong relationship the university has with its 99,000 graduates."

A grand opening, including tours, is planned for Homecoming day, Oct. 20.

CMU vs. . . .

There's nothing like a battle of good quarterbacks to get the 1990 season under way at Kelly/Shorts Stadium. And, that's just what's in store for the "Community Day" fans today when the Univesity of Cincinnati Bearcats and the Central Michigan University Chippewas square off at 1:09 p.m.

The Bearcats of second-year coach Tim Murphy will look to redshirt freshman signal-caller Paul Anderson of Sterling Heights, Mich., while CMU will count on junior Jeff Bender to key the offense.

Both clubs are 0-1 entering the non-conference matchup. It marks the first time the two schools have met.

Cincinnati dropped a 34-20 decision to Bowling Green last Sunday in its opener despite 243 yards in total offense by Anderson. He passed for 195 yards and two TDs and rushed for 48 more.

"We're definitely concerned with containing Anderson," CMU's 13-year veteran head coach Herb Deromedi said. "He's big and strong and has a great arm. He makes Cincinnati's offense potent."

In the Maroon and Gold, Bender is the man. He completed 18-of-29 passes for 201 yards and one TD in a 20-17 loss at the University of Kentucky. He also ran for a 13-vard TD.

"Jeff performed well under the pressure of being on the road with all that noise," Deromedi said. "He showed he came back to play this year after being hindered by an injury last season."

Cincinnati's loss in Riverfront Stadium was a lot closer than the final 14-point spread might indicate. It was tied 20-20 late in the game when BG took the lead and then scored again with no time on the clock.

"Bowling Green is a much improved team and Cincinnati battled it right to the end," Deromedi said. "Cincinnati's strength on defense lies in its secondary with excellent speed at the corners. And, the defensive line is much bigger than Kentucky's.'

Free safety Rodney Harris and cornerback Ronnie Shannon had 10 tackles against BG to lead the defense. The other corner is Kelly Sims. Up front, the Bearcats are huge with Barry Robinson (5-11, 272) at middle guard and John Thornton (6-4, 286) and Kyle Stroh (6-3, 258) at the tackles.

Anderson, a 6-4, 195-pounder, hit tight end Kris Bjorson six times for 62 yards in the opener and teamed with freshman split end Marlon Pearce three times for 69 vards. Both caught TDs.

Central outgained the Wildcats, 343 yards to 216, and picked up 21 first downs to 15. However, nine penalties for 73 yards (Kentucky had but one for 10 yards) and a blocked punt proved too much to overcome.

"It was a disappointing loss," Deromedi said. "I don't believe in moral victories, but I was proud of our effort and our execution at times was good. That game is history, though, and we have a formidable foe in Cincinnati. It will be another difficult game."

Bender hit junior Ken Ealy with five of his completions at Kentucky, including one for a 42-yard TD. Junior Bob Kench caught five more while reserve tailback Darnell Rush snared four. Rush also made the most of his plaving time by carrying the ball 21 times for 87 yards.

"Darnell gave us some good, solid football," Deromedi said. "He caught the ball well and ran with authority north and south.

Junior Bily Smith is still listed as the No. 1 tailback, but the Chippewas will share the running duties.

Deromedi also praised the blocking efforts of senior fullback loe Connolly - the tailback's best friend. "I'm just a guard wearing No. 46," the 6-2, 230-pounder has often joked.

While the offense is young and improving, the Chippewa strength figures to be the defense and it didn't disappoint at Kentucky.

"We forced Kentucky to punt seven times, and that says a lot about our effort on defense," Deromedi said.

CMU rotates a quartet of players at inside linebacker, and two of them were honored following the game. Senior Rich Curtiss (10 solo and one assisted stop) was named MAC defensive "Player of the Week" while junior Todd Reynolds was CMU Special Teams "Player of the Week." Also playing well at that position were senior Scott Lamphere and junior Clarence Rose.

The Chippewas hit the road again next week for their final non-conference clash at the University of Akron. CMU returns home on Sept. 22 to play Bowling Green in the MAC opener. It will be Parents' Day.

The Bill Boyden Leadership Award Committee and Central Michigan University are proud to announce Redford native Sue Nissen as the 1990 Boyden Award winner.

Nissen, a senior majoring in prephysical therapy and health fitness, is third on the all-time CMU scoring list with 1,466 points entering her fourth year as a starter.

The 6-0 forward from Dearborn Divine Child was runner-up in Mid-American Conference "Player-of-the-Year" balloting last season after leading the league in scoring (17.2) and finishing third in rebounding (9.2).

A 3.51 student, Nissen has twice been named to the MAC all-academic team, and was a second team GTE Academic All-America choice as a sophomore. She has been named to the all-conference first team as a freshman and junior, and made the second team as a sophomore.

Among her accomplishments was a string of 30 consecutive games scoring in double figures which stretched from her sophomore to junior season.

The Boyden Award winner is selected each spring from among those applicants who are varsity letter winners and will be seniors the following fall. The award is not primarily an academic one. Instead, it singles out that senior to be of satisfactory academic standing whose record best combines participation in a varsity intercollegiate sport with leadership ability in campus affairs and activities, interest or accomplishments in the arts, and community involvement.

The Boyden award is designed to honor that athlete who is and will be an exemplary representative of Central Michigan University.

Upon graduation the winning applicant is provided a cash grant of at least \$1,500 for continuation of education or furtherance of other career goals. Alternatively, because of NCAA regulations, if the recepient is on athletic scholarship, he or she may direct the \$1,500 cash award to any department or project within the university. The award winner's name is inscribed on the permanent plaque located prominently in Rose Arena. The honoree also is presented with an individual plaque and special gold "C"



Boyden Award lapel pin.

Nominations for the Boyden Award may be made directly by the nominee or by a coach, teacher or fellow student. Applications for the award are available at the athletic office and must be submitted between January 1 and April 1 of each year.

The Bill Boyden Leadership Award was established in memory of W. B. ("Bill") Boyden. Bill was a 1935 Central graduate. His life and accomplishments demonstrated a unique blend of athletic ability, leadership, business acumen, participation in the arts and an extraordinary involvment in community activities.

Bill was a football and track star who earned recognition as most valuable backfield man in his senior

year at Central and set a Central Michigan record for the 100-yard dash in track which stood for many years. Active on campus, Bill was elected President of Central's Student Council and acted in several campus dramatic productions.

Following graduation, and before embarking on a successful business career Bill spent a rewarding year teaching and coaching baseball and basketball at Peck High School in the Thumb Area of Michigan. In addition to his work in the private business arena, he demonstrated a lifelong commitment to his community. He was a past president of the Muskegon YMCA, the Rotary Club, the Salvation Army Board and held leadership positions in his church.

One major focus of his attention was CMU.

Some reflection of the great pride and affection Bill held for his beloved alma mater is witnessed by the considerable time, energy and service he volunteered to CMU. Until his untimely death in 1980, he was a long time member of the University Development Board, serving twice as its chairman. As a member of that board, Bill is acknowledged as the initial motivating force behind the construction of Kelly/Shorts Stadium. Bill Boyden honored Central Michigan during his life and the Boyden Award seeks to honor and continue promotion of his ideals and his university.






UT Coach Has Tough Task In First Year

Nick Saban is a marked man.

The first-year University of Toledo coach not only faces the 1990 season with the normal adjustments of a rookie mentor, but he has the additional burden of guiding, "the team to beat.'

The Mid-American Conference (MAC) News Media Association selected the Rockets as the team to win the '90 crown and earn a trip to the California Raisin Bowl in December.

"So many things can happen between now and the end of the season," said the 1973 graduate of Kent State University. "I feel there are six teams with a chance to win the league.

14 starters, though, the Rockets are the favorites. Winning four of their final five games, including a 29-6 romp over Central, didn't hurt, either.

Toledo received 29 first-place votes and finished with 507 points while Eastern Michigan was second with 462 and 13 firstplace ballots. Central Michigan (five) was third with 451, Western Michigan (seven) fourth at 414 and defending champion Ball State (one) fifth at 357.

Following is a team-by-team rundown of MAC football in 1990:

TOLEDO (6-5 overall, 6-2 MAC in '89) - New coach Nick Saban has plenty of talent and experience to work with, led by exciting sophomore quarterback Kevin Meger and big-play receivers Rick Isaiah and Romauldo Brown.

UT has a solid offensive line and a "noname" defense that may be the key to the Rockets success. The lack of an established tailback may take its toll, however.

EASTERN (7-3-1, 6-2) - Despite losing 12 starters and 22 lettermen, the Hurons look to be contenders because of the program Jim Harkema has built.

"We've been here seven years, and it takes time to build a program to the point where good kids are continually coming up to replace the ones who leave," Harkema said.

After leading the league in defense a year ago, EMU points to that side of the ball as its strength. The defensive line is proven but the linebacking and secondary corps are not.

A three-way battle looms at QB, and tailback is wide open with Perry Foster not returning from a 1,087-vard season.

CENTRAL (6-5, 5-2-1) — The Chippewas hope to ride a stingy defense and an improving offense to their first MAC championship in 10 years. A total of 41 lettermen and 15 starters are back for CMU, including four former all-MAC performers tailback John Hood (could play by midseason), defensive tackle J.J. Wierenga, free safety David Johnson and linebacker Rich Curtiss.

Herb Deromedi, the dean of MAC coaches entering his 13th season, looks to kicking productivity and offensive efficiency (reduced turnovers) as keys to success.

In addition to Wierenga, Johnson, and Curtiss, six more starters return on defense.

WESTERN (5-6, 3-5) - Coming off a season with four one-point losses, fourthyear coach Al Molde is optimistic his Broncos can turn it around in 1990.

The key for WMU is the development of sophomore QB Brad Tayles, a youngster who threw for 1,909 yards as a freshman. He also had 25 interceptions.

The defensive line is strong and deep, but the secondary may prove to be Western's Achille's heel. The Broncos are also looking for a tailback.

BALL STATE (7-3-2, 6-1-1) - If the Cardinals are to become the first team to repeat in the MAC since Central did it in 1980, it'll take superb efforts from talented tailback Bernie Parmalee and a rugged defense.

Parmalee will be the new star of the BSU offense with the graduation of QB David Riley. The 6-0, 196-pounder gained 672 yards a year ago but will be counted on more heavily this season.

Coach Paul Schudel's Cardinals have won 15 games the past two seasons, better-

ing the 14 they won in his first three. BSU returns 29 lettermen and 12 starters.

BOWLING GREEN (5-6, 5-3-0) - After living by the pass for a number of years, fifth-year coach Moe Ankney hopes to have a passing attack this season to complement a strong running game. Sophomore tailback LeRoy Smith gained

564 yards in his rookie season, and he's expected to be the show this year. Plus, he has a veteran and talented line in front of him.

In all, 45 lettermen are back for the Falcons, four starters on offense and seven on defense. Six different candidates are vying for the starting QB spot vacated by Rich Dackin (he threw for 2,679 yards last season).

MIAMI (2-8-1, 2-5-1) - First-year coach Randy Walker, a 1976 Miami grad, takes over the Redskins under unusual terms -Miami has had three straight losing seasons.

"Normally a new coach comes into Miami trying to maintain the winning tradition," he said. "But, we've got only one way to go, and that's up."

A total of 43 lettermen return, including 18 starters. Redshirt frosh QB Jim Clement



Senior linebacker Rich Curtiss has been CMU's No. 1 tackler the last two seasons and is expected to lead an experienced defense again this year. The Chippewas have nine starters back on a unit that led the MAC in scoring defense last fall.



Eastern Michigan's Bob Navarro tied for the national interception title a year ago with 12 from his defensive back post. The senior earned all-MAC and honorable mention All-America honors in '89.

is a key after beating out three others for the job in the spring. Of the 18 starters back, only 11 are listed as regulars entering the '90 season.

OHIO (1-9-1, 1-6-1) - Rookie head coach Tom Lichtenberg's first chore with the Bobcats is to develop a winning attitude for a program that hasn't won a title since 1968.

"We may fail, but we'll never lose a game," he said. "We've made wholesale lineup changes, trying to get the best people on the field."


The performance of senior QB Anthony Thorton (suspended in the spring) is a key. He totaled 2,407 yards last season on the ground and in the air.

Ohio returns just 19 lettermen.

KENT (0-11, 0-8) - The return to the MAC of former Miami coach Dick Crum has been less enjoyable. He's 5-17 overall in two years, and has just seven seniors on this year's club.

"We won't have a senior on defense, but I think we'll be a better club," Crum said.

The Golden Flashes have 30 lettermen back, including eight starters on offense and seven on defense.

The 1971 football season was a special one to Mike and Dave McCov.

It was the one season at Central Michigan University that the brothers from North Farmington High played together.

"There was always a McCoy playing," said Dave, with a chuckle. "My parents made it to every game, and they could always see one of us on the field."

Mike, who also played basketball for two seasons for the Chippewas, was a defensive back in '71 who led the team in interceptions with three. Dave led the team in receptions with 13 for 172 vards and one TD as a wide receiver.

"Playing football with Dave was one of my fondest memories," Mike said. "I also have a lot of great memories playing at Alumni Field."

The McCoy brothers are now successful businessmen in the Detroit area.

Mike, 40 and a 1972 CMU grad, is the president of Mr. Build in Walled Lake, a company listed among the nation's top 50 remodeling contractors by Remodeling Magazine.

Dave, 37 and a '74 CMU grad, is the national sales manager for H.B. Fuller Company in Warren.

Mike and his wife, Nancy, live in West Bloomfield with son Bryan and daughter Laura Megan while Dave lives in Farmington Hills with his wife, Susan, and daughters Shannon and Kelly, and son Matt. Susan is the former Susan Cage, A CMU grad and a record-holder for the Chippewa swim team.

Avid golfers who team each summer to play in the CMU Football Alumni Golf Outing (they've won it four times), the McCoys played football for Roy Kramer at Central and cherished the experience.


"I felt lucky to have played for him," said Mike. "His moving talks and halftime speeches were special."
