In July 2020, a severe bicycle accident left him in a coma and unable to speak upon waking. This event halted his professional speaking and musical gigs. During recovery, Bruce joined Virtual Connections for Aphasia. Having made significant progress, he now feels prepared present his story to others.

Stories help us make sense and move forward when life is in chaos such as after brain injury. Bruce and Katie will share evidenced-based methods that feature people with aphasia and their clinicians partnering to use story to support recovery in navigating one's past, present, and future as highlighted through Bruce's story.
