#### **Dr. Meena Ramani General Endowment in Pediatrics**

Established in 2024 by Dr. Meena Ramani to support and enhance the work and continued growth and learning of the faculty, staff, and students of the CMU College of Medicine Pediatrics program. Dr. Ramani, MD is a pediatrics specialist in Saginaw, MI and has over 51 years of experience in the medical field. The funds shall provide support to advance medical education and professional development for CMU Pediatric Program including, but not limited to, students (non-scholarship activities and programs), residents, research, and continuing education and development for CMU Health Pediatrics faculty and staff in the Saginaw area. Preference will be given to support graduate medical education and community initiatives.

#### **Christina Marie Wentworth Memorial Award**

Established in 2024 in memory of Christina Marie Wentworth, the granddaughter of Donald and Marcia Wentworth. Christina passed away in infancy in 1992. This renewable scholarship will support undergraduate students enrolled in the Nursing BSN Program who have a cumulative minimum GPA of 2.0 and demonstrate financial need.

### **Endowment Criteria Changes**

#### **Michigan Hemingway Endowment**

The Michigan Hemingway Endowment was established in 2005 by Michael Federspiel '81, '86. Michael is an emeritus professor of history at Central Michigan University, having served as a faculty member from 2000-2019. He also served as a member of the Clarke Historical Library Board of Governors from 2008-2021. He is the author of two books about Ernest Hemingway and northern Michigan. In 2002, after amassing a large collection of Hemingway materials, Michael donated them to the Clarke Historical Library. The Clarke is now nationally recognized as the preeminent location for those interested in Hemingway and Michigan. This endowment will support the Clarke Historical Library's "Ernest Hemingway in Michigan" Collection. Funds will be used for the acquisition of material and dissemination of information relating to Ernest Hemingway's life in Michigan, his published or unpublished writings and other activities, such as motion pictures, that draw upon Hemingway's Michigan experiences. To provide additional support to the "Ernest Hemingway in Michigan" Collection, funds may also be utilized for associated stewardship of said Collection and for

programmatic and promotional activities related to advancing knowledge of Hemingway's literary and personal connections to the state.

### **Opperman Public Relations Scholarship**

This scholarship was established in 2024 by Sarah '81 and Daniel Opperman. Sarah joined The Dow Chemical Company's public affairs office right after graduation and served the company for more than 28 years before retiring in 2009 as vice president of Global Government Affairs and Public Policy. Daniel was an attorney for 25 years prior to being named a judge and currently serves as Chief Judge for the Eastern District Bankruptcy Court. The Oppermans have donated to CMU projects including the development of the College of Medicine's Student Resource Library, the Opperman Public Relations Internship Endowment, the Sarah and Daniel Opperman Auditorium within the Park Library and the Leadership Institute that now bears Sarah's name. This non-renewable scholarship will support Undergraduate, Incoming Freshman or Transfer students who have an interest in the study of public relations and a cumulative minimum GPA of 3.0.

### **Saltarelli Family Physician Assistant Fund**

Established in 2023 by William Saltarelli, Ph.D. and Diane Saltarelli '92. Dr. Saltarelli was a professor in the College of Health Professions at CMU for over 32 years and an educational instructor for a total of 46 years. He dedicated his scholarly pursuits to both cardiovascular disease prevention in children as well as implementing novel teaching methods in Human Anatomy. Since the inception of CMU's Physician Assistant program, many students have benefited from his advising, mentorship, and knowledge of clinical human anatomy. Their daughter Katelyn is also a graduate of CMU's Physician Assistant Program, now specializing in pediatric medicine. These funds will provide stipends to financially support Physician Assistant Program students who incur expenses while participating in assigned clinical clerkship rotations. The amounts awarded may vary and should be determined based upon the recipient's specific needs, which may include but not be limited to the cost of travel, housing, etc. Qualified recipients must be 2nd-year Physician Assistant student(s) with preference given to recipients demonstrating financial need. These funds are not renewable.

That in Lot 1C, a total of 7 signs: 1 CMU Vehicle west side of E row, 1 RHD east side of east row, 1 NW Apartments BMW east side of east row, 2 NW Apartments 2 Reserved Signs 0627 and 0628 on the west side of building 3 and 2 Reserved for Res Life Vehicles Only on the south side of building 7.

8.26 Attached hereto and made a part hereof is a map entitled “Campus Map Central Michigan University, 2024-2025” setting forth and locating parking lots on the campus of Central Michigan University, Mt. Pleasant, Michigan, and setting forth the persons who may use such lots and the time and manner of such permitted use. Violation of the provisions contained on the map and on the reverse side of the map setting forth persons who may use such lots and the time and manner of such permitted use is a violation of this ordinance.

This amendment shall take effect **August 26, 2024, at 12:01 o'clock a.m.**

## Parking Regulations

The CMU Police/Parking Services Department is located in the Combined Services Building.

**Vehicle Registration**

All motor vehicles, including motorcycles and mopeds parked on Central Michigan University property by students, faculty/staff (food service/janitorial contract employees, etc.) visitors and vendors, must be registered with the CMU Police/Parking Services Department and shall have a valid Central Michigan University parking permit. Exceptions include metered and mobile pay spaces.

- Permits are active immediately following online registration.
- A student is not allowed to register a vehicle owned by another student or another student's family.

**Changing Vehicles**

If needing to change a vehicle on a permit due to an accident or bringing a different vehicle to campus, you must go online to update your vehicle information at [parking.cmu.edu](http://parking.cmu.edu).

**Parking Regulations**

All permit holders must park their vehicles in designated lots only. All parking lot permit regulations are in effect Monday through Friday from 2 a.m. to 5 p.m. From 5 p.m. to 2 a.m., you do not need a parking permit to park on campus. **There is no parking at any time in Lot 41 (near Towers Residence halls), which is restricted to faculty/staff only.** Designated meter and mobile pay spaces are available to pay and park for those without a permit. (See Metered/Parking Mobile Pay.)

There is **NO PARKING** in any area from 2 a.m. to 6 a.m., except for on-campus residents with a valid CMU resident or apartment parking permit. Service drives, handicap spaces, restricted areas, reserved spaces and fire lanes are enforced 7 days a week, 24 hours a day year-round.

- All vehicles must be parked within designated parking spaces.
- Parking so that a portion of the vehicle hangs over or blocks a sidewalk is prohibited.
- Parking is prohibited in any driveway (including end of a row, service drive, loading dock, etc.) at any time unless otherwise posted.
- Back in/pull through parking is prohibited without a state issued or CMU issued front license plate.

When classes are NOT in session, between academic semesters parking enforcement will continue in all faculty/staff lots, metered, reserved, service drive, handicapped spaces and fire lanes.

**Summer parking regulations still require permits and are allowed additional privileges such as:**

- Commuter permits may park in commuter and all residential hall lots.
- On-campus resident permits may park in all residential hall lots.
- On-campus apartment permits may park in apartment, commuter and all residential lots.
- Faculty/staff permits may park in faculty/staff, commuter and all residential/apartment lots.

**Guest/Visitor Parking:** Designated parking areas is dependent upon visit location.

**Handicapped Parking:** A motor vehicle with a valid CMU permit may park in a handicap space with one of the following: (a) a university handicapped parking permit from Parking Services OR (b) displaying a State of Michigan (or other state) issued handicapped plate or hang tag. Visitors must display a state handicapped permit and have a CMU guest permit.

**Metered Parking:** When parking at a meter, note the maximum time and hours of operation on the meter head. Campus meters will only accept United States quarters. A failed meter is considered a no-parking zone.

Meter fees must be paid between 6 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. No parking shall be permitted in a metered parking zone between 2 a.m. and 6 a.m.

**Mobile Pay:** If using mobile pay vehicles must be parked in a mobile pay space. Note the maximum time and hours of operation for each lot/session. No parking shall be permitted between 2 a.m. and 6 a.m.

**Closing of Parking Areas:** The university reserves the right to temporarily close any parking area for a special event, construction or other purpose deemed necessary by CMU Police.

**Liability:** Central Michigan University or any of its employees assume no responsibility for loss from theft or damage to motor vehicles and micro-mobility devices parked in university parking lots.

**Special Event Parking:** Those attending special events on campus should park in designated event lots as assigned and as directed by event staff. A special event parking fee may be charged at the lot entrance. Some event lots are reserved for those with special passes (such as Chippewas Club, etc.). Visitor, faculty/staff and student permits are not valid in the lots during special events.

- Visitors, students and faculty/staff attending football events at Kelly/Shorts Stadium may utilize specific lots surrounding the stadium through a daily parking fee or a displayed valid Chippewas Club member parking pass. On football game days, only football game day passes are valid. Individuals parking in Lot 63 (near the Kelly/Shorts Stadium) will be directed to evacuate the lot for game day parking.

**Traffic Regulations**

**Laws in Effect:** The Michigan Motor Vehicle Code and university traffic ordinances are in effect on university property.

**Speed:** The speed limit on campus property is 25 mph unless otherwise posted.

**Electric Skate Board, Electric Scooter and Micro-Mobility Devices:** While on sidewalks on the CMU campus, all personal and professionally owned micro-mobility devices must obey a strict 10 mph speed limit. All professionally owned scooters will be programmed to self-limit to a top speed of 10 mph while operating within the campus boundaries. Users must park at bike racks or designated parking corrals on campus. Micro-mobility devices are prohibited from use, possession, charging or storage inside all university buildings.

**Accidents:** Motor vehicle accidents on university property must be reported to the CMU Police Department by calling 989-774-3081.

**Parking Enforcement Re-ticketing Guidelines**

**Re-ticketing times:** The times for re-ticketing vehicles parked in violation at the same location are as follows:

- Meters and mobile pay spaces can be re-ticketed after two (2) hours (maximum of two per day).
- Service drives and all other violations may be re-ticketed after four (4) hours (maximum of two per day).

**Towing**

Vehicles parked in violation of university parking regulations, those that have five or more outstanding violations, failing to comply with the mandatory lot evacuation schedule, or situations deemed necessary by CMU Police may be towed at the owner's expense.

- Vehicles displaying a fraudulent plate may be towed at the owner's expense.

**Parking Areas by Permit**

**Permit C - Commuter**

- Lots 1, 2, 6, 14, 16, 22, 27, 28, 33N, 33S, 51, 62E, 62W, 64, 65, Calumet Dr. and all M lots. Must pay at meters or mobile pay spaces. No overnight parking in "C" commuter lots.

**Permit F - Faculty/Staff**

- Lots 3, 6, 7, 11, 12, 13, 16, 20, 21, 22(F), 23, 29, 31, 34, 41, 52, 54, 55(F), 56, 61, 63, 69 and all commuter and M lots. Must pay at meters or mobile pay spaces. No overnight parking in "C" commuter lots.

**Permit G - Graduate Housing**

- Lots Graduate apartments (north section of lot 6), also includes all "C" commuter and M lots. Must pay at meters or mobile pay spaces. No overnight parking in "C" commuter lots.

**Permit M - Maroon Residents**

- Lots 63, 70 and 75. Must pay at meters or mobile pay spaces.

**Permit S - South**

- Lots 22 (designated south section), 39, 40, 42, 43, 44, 45, 46, 47, 52, 53, 55S (except faculty/staff area within lot 55), 62E, 62W, 64 and all M lots. Must pay at meters or mobile pay spaces.

**S0 Permit**

Senior Officers parking privileges include all campus parking lots and meters, except metered parking in lot 15, the Bovee University Center circle drive and any other special designated spaces.

The Michigan Vehicle Code, Central Michigan University established Ordinances and Rules & Regulations are adopted by the CMU Board of Trustees as part of the CMU Traffic Ordinance.

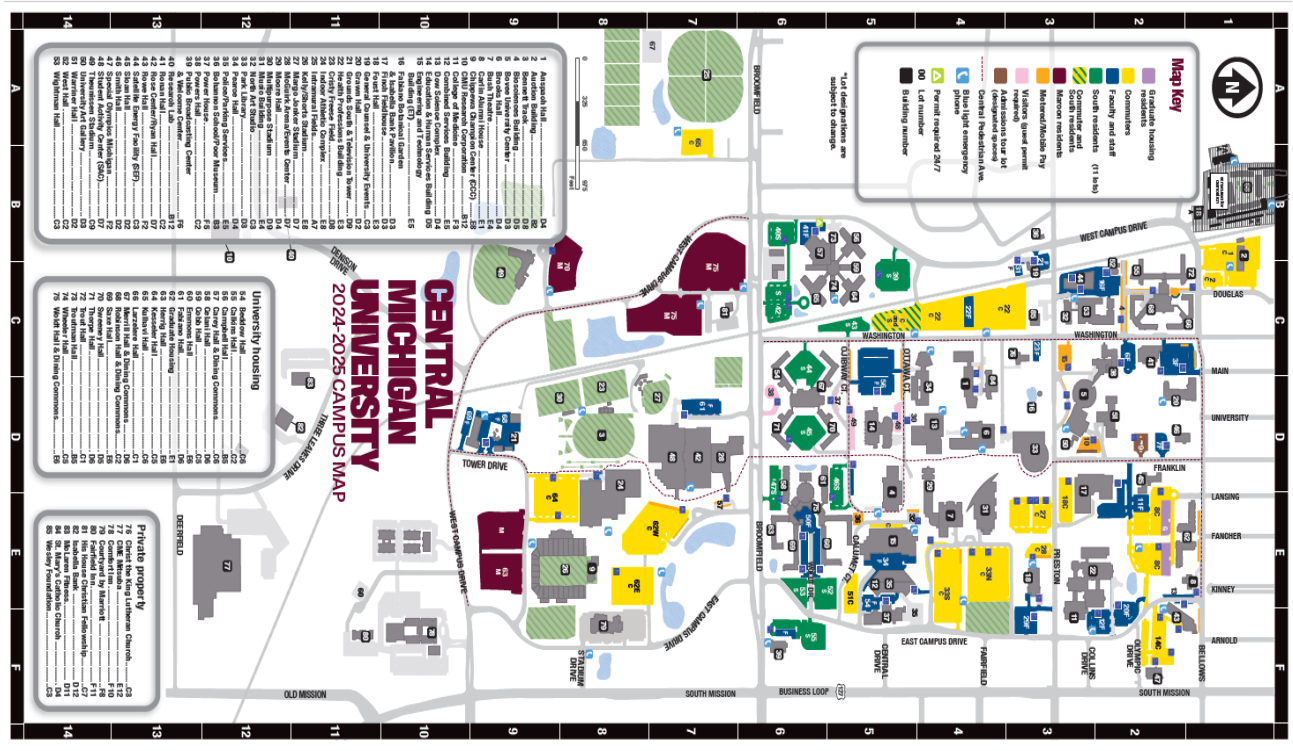

**TRAFFIC ORDINANCE AMENDMENTS: HANDICAP PARKING: CONSENT AGENDA**

1. The Board of Trustees establishes and amends the CMU Traffic Ordinance to Govern and Control Parking, Traffic and Pedestrians. The Traffic Ordinance becomes law and is enforceable in the courts of Michigan.
2. The CMU Police Department identified several changes which are needed. This resolution would amend the ordinance.

BE IT RESOLVED, That the CMU Traffic Ordinance to Govern and Control Parking, Traffic and Pedestrians at Central Michigan University is amended, effective on June 26, 2024, at 12:01 a.m. (unless otherwise indicated), as follows:

**Traffic Ordinance 8.1310(a) (Amended)**

8.1310 It shall be unlawful by a fine of \$150.00 to park in a location designated as handicap parking without displaying an authorized handicap-parking permit. A vehicle parked in violation of this section may also be subject to a vehicle tow at the owner’s expense, as well as other enforcement provisions of this Ordinance. For the purposes of 8.1310, authorized handicap permits shall be the following:

1. Central Michigan University (CMU) handicap parking permit
2. State of Michigan or reciprocal state issued handicap parking permit, or
3. Handicap registration plates issued by the State of Michigan or reciprocal state

In order to park in a handicap parking space on campus, an individual must display both the appropriate handicap-parking permit and his or her CMU parking pass as required for students, faculty and staff.



(Visitors may park in handicapped parking locations accessible for public use by displaying a **state authorized permit as well as a CMU handicap parking permit.**)

### **NAMING OPPORTUNITIES POLICY UPDATES: CONSENT AGENDA**

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board of Trustees approves the following policy updates for Naming Opportunities Policy 11-31(R) as proposed by Vice President for Advancement, Jennifer Cotter, including:

Remove the following language:

- “Generally, naming opportunities will not be recognized through a planned or deferred gift until the gift amount is accessible. However, naming opportunities may be considered through an irrevocable planned gift at the discounted present value under special circumstances.”

Add the following language:

- “Minimum gift thresholds may be reviewed at any time by the vice president of advancement to maintain alignment with tuition and inflation increases. Threshold increases will be sent to the Board of Trustees for approval. Annual Scholarship and quasi-endowment funds do not require board approval.”
- Removal clause that reflects current endowment agreement templated language.

Update terminology:

- Replace “Entire Buildings” with “New Buildings” and
- Replace “Young Faculty Award” with “New Faculty Award.”

Document Increases to Endowed Fund Minimums:

- Endowed Faculty Award from \$25,000 to \$50,000.
- Endowed Programmatic Fund from \$25,000 to \$35,000.
- Endowed Programmatic Fund for PBS from \$10,000 to \$25,000.
- Endowed Undergraduate Scholarship from \$25,000 to \$35,000.

Discontinued Award Types:

- Full CMED Scholarship,
- Named Endowed Centralis Scholar Award,
- Named Student Award Fund, and
- Named ProfEd Scholarship.

**SUBJECT: Naming opportunities**

It has long been Central Michigan University's practice to name facilities, roads, endowments, awards, and other programs in honor of people who have contributed to the betterment of the university. Because such gifts will be substantial in amount and may reflect on CMU in perpetuity, naming opportunities, and the terms and conditions associated with such naming, shall be subject to final approval by the Board of Trustees. Principal responsibility for soliciting and arranging for naming opportunities resides with the president of the university and the vice president of advancement. Gifts to name facilities, endowments, awards, and other programs established must be irrevocable and meet the minimum present day dollar value requirements set by the Board of Trustees. The president and vice president are encouraged to adhere to the funding minimums defined in this guideline in their preliminary negotiations, but they are also granted the discretion, in consultation with each other and subject to final Board approval, to consider other funding arrangements which will best serve the wishes of the donor and the interests of CMU. ~~Generally, naming opportunities will not be recognized through a planned or deferred gift until the gift amount is accessible. However, naming opportunities may be considered through an irrevocable planned gift at the discounted present value under special circumstances.~~ Minimum gift thresholds may be reviewed at any time by the vice president for advancement to maintain alignment with tuition and inflation increases. **Subject: Naming Opportunities**

<b>New Buildings</b>	Names of new buildings present special considerations for naming opportunities. The minimum contribution amount will be determined by the President and Vice President of Advancement on a case-by-case basis.
<b>Unnamed Existing Buildings</b>	Currently unnamed buildings may be named equivalent to 12.5% of the fair market value of the building.
<b>Building Additions and Renovations</b>	Not less than 50% of project costs.
<b>Portions of Buildings</b>	Individual rooms or wings in new or existing buildings, such as auditoriums, lecture halls and lobbies, need to be considered on a case-by-case basis. Consideration will be given to such matters as type of usage, visibility, or traffic flow.
<b>Relocation</b>	The name on an existing facility will remain for the life of the building.
<b>Replacement</b>	The name on a facility to be demolished will not be transferred to a new facility except in such cases when a useful facility is relocated to serve the greater interest of the university.
<b>Removal</b>	The University reserves the right to remove and rescind any public recognition of the fund and/or the donor. Reasons for removal of the recognition may include but are not limited to: if the naming affiliation presents risk to the reputation of Central Michigan University and/or other campus partner(s), if the donor fails to maintain payments on a pledge upon which the naming was bestowed, or a planned gift upon which the naming was bestowed does not result in the value agreed upon.

<b>Colleges or Schools</b>	Associating an individual, corporation or foundation name with a college or school acknowledges great commitment on the part of the donor. The board reserves the right, after consultation with the president and vice president of advancement, to approve funding which best serves the interests of CMU.
<b>Distinguished Professorship or Dean's Chair</b>	A distinguished professorship or dean's chair will enable the university to honor or recruit an outstanding scholar who has demonstrated the potential of making exceptional contributions to their discipline. Income from the endowment will provide support toward salary, professional development, related research, and program expenses. <b>Minimum Endowment Gift: \$2.0 Million</b>
<b>Chair</b>	Provides income toward an outstanding faculty member's salary and related expenses, including research and professional development. <b>Minimum Endowment Gift: \$1.0 Million</b>
<b>Professorship</b>	Provides support for an outstanding faculty member and related expenses. <b>Minimum Endowment Gift: \$500,000</b>
<b>Visiting Professorship</b>	Provides income to apply toward expenses for a visiting professor. These professorships will allow the university to benefit from talent which would otherwise be unavailable. <b>Minimum Endowment Gift: \$250,000</b>
<b>New Faculty Award</b>	A new faculty award will enable CMU to attract and retain the most promising new professors. Provides income to apply toward the annual salary and teaching/research expenses of a new faculty scholar. <b>Minimum Endowment Gift: \$250,000</b>
<b>Lectureship</b>	Provides income for distinguished lecturers to be brought to campus. <b>Minimum Endowment Gift: \$100,000</b>
<b>Faculty Development Fund</b>	Provides an annual award to enhance a faculty member's teaching and research activities. <b>Minimum Endowment Gift: \$100,000</b>
<b>Faculty Award</b>	Provides an annual award to recognize and support the work of an outstanding faculty member. <b>Minimum Endowment Gift: \$50,000</b> <b>Minimum Annual Gift: \$5,000 per year for 5 years</b>

### **PRESIDENTIAL SEARCH UPDATE**

Trustee Mallett provided an update on the status of the presidential search. Right after the April Board of Trustees meeting, the presidential search website was made active. Through the efforts of the Presidential Search Advisory Committee, with guidance from consultants at WittKieffer, the Leadership Profile was finalized, which outlines the desired qualities and qualification for the next CMU President.

The Leadership Profile was made available to potential candidates on May 31 along with targeted advertising and extensive outreach. The established timeline for the search includes a meeting of the search advisory committee on July 23 to discuss the review process, a review of applicants at an August 7 meeting, and first round interview by the search advisory committee on August 20-21. The Board of Trustees will conduct interviews in September with the most promising candidates forwarded to them by the committee.

The Board is staying on the original timeline and is committed to maintaining transparency and engagement throughout the search process.
